MAY BIRD LOST FIRST OF SEASON AT WORCESTER

Vanola Too Much for Fox's
Mare—Roan Had Captured
Free-for-All Race in
Straight Heats.

Worcester, Mass., July 19. — The three races on the card for the third day of Worcester's four-day Bay State Circuit meeting this afternoon furnished the best racing in the circuit this season. Roan Hal, in the free-for-all, was the only favorite to come through.

May Bird was beaten for the first time this season in the 2.14 pace by Vanola, little thought of before the second heat. Lady Gamage, second choice in this race, could land no better than third money.

Lucky Clover took the 2.19 trot after a superb race, the middle heat of which was in 2.12 1/4.

In winning the free-for-all, Roan Hal set the track record for pacers over the Greendale track at 2.07 1/4. The old record was 2.04 1/4. eH won the first two heats handily, but in the last Major Woolworth, second choice, made a rush in the stretch for the heta and all but landed.

The meeting will end tomorrow with the 2.11 pace and two divisions of the 2.03 trot. The summary:

HONUS WAGNER IS HONORED BY BOSTON PLAYERS

Twentieth Anniversary of His
Entrance Into Big League
Ball Marked by a Pre-
sentation.

Boston, July 20. — Twenty years ago yesterday Honus Wagner played his first game in the big league, and the owners and players of the Boston club presented him as a souvenir a fishing outfit. Wagner is temporarily out of the game through an injury, but he is still very much in it, to all intents and purposes. Many old timers were invited to be present yesterday.

John K. Tener, president of the National League: I am glad that you propose to recognize Honus Wagner, the greatest ball player of all time, by setting apart a day on which to pay tribute to his sterling qualities. By reason of his deportment and exceptional ability he has endeared himself to the baseball public and is in every respect a great credit to the game.

P. J. Donovan, manager Buffalo club: Time has given lustre to his record which is appreciated most by men by myself, who played against him 20 years ago.

Hugh Jennings, manager Detroit club: Boston is honoring one of the game's greatest players and a credit to the profession.

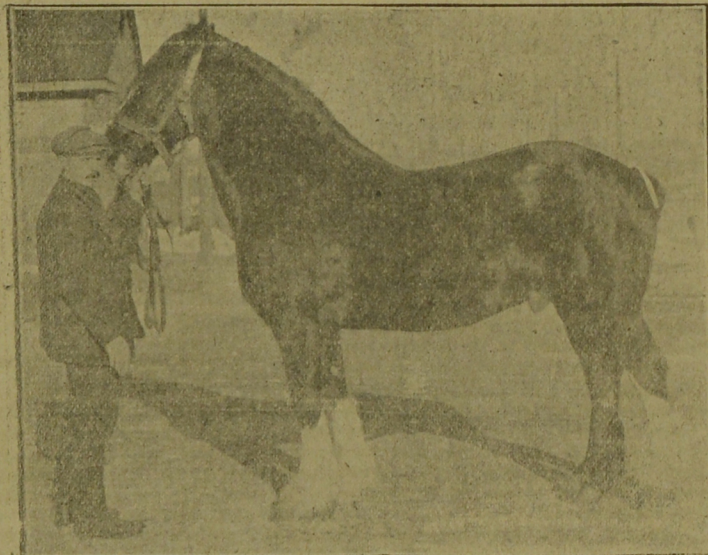

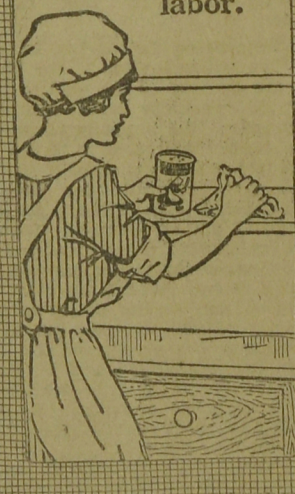
