## RUMORED THAT SIR WILFRID MAY GIVE UP LEADERSHIP

### The Venerable Chieftain of the Liberal Party Now Said to Have the Matter Under Consideration--In Conference With Party Lieutenants in Montreal--The Names of Hon George P. Graham and Mr. F. B. Carvell M. P. Mentioned as Successors to Sir Wilfrid

Ottawa, Oct. 3. — The prospective retirement of Liberalism's veteran and revered leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier from the unceasing stress and responsibility of party leadership and the beginning of fusion government through the swearing in of Lieut.-Col. C. C. Ballentyne, a Montreal Liberal and a millionaire paint manufacturer as minister of public works in the Borden cabinet, were the swift and sensational political developments of today. The retirement of Sir Wilfrid, after thirty years of splendid and history-making service for Canada and the empire, is as yet only prospective. There is no doubt that the question is being considered at Sir Wilfrid's request by his party lieutenants, but definite decision will not be made until next week after the whole situation has been canvassed in all its aspects with representative Liberals from various parts of the Dominion who will consult with the Liberal leader during the next few days.

This afternoon Sir Wilfrid went to Montreal where he will spend tomorrow. Monday he will go to Toronto to consult with Liberals there. One thing is certain. If Sir Wilfrid decides to turn over the burden of leadership to some successor to be chosen by party convention his retirement will be wholly on his own request, and because he thinks, all things being considered, he can serve the interests of Canadian democracy and Canadian unity better as a lieutenant in the ranks than as head of the party.

#### Remain in Public Life

Dearly as Sir Wilfrid would like to take a rest after nearly half a century of strenuous public life and enjoy the leisure of his library, he has no intention of withholding his ripe judgment and his experienced statesmanship from the service of the country in a time of crisis. He will, in any event, remain in public life as long as he believes he can be of use to the national welfare, and his colleagues would only consent to his withdrawal from the leadership on the understanding that he will still be in the fight, give his counsels to his successor and exercise his commanding influence towards securing the utmost possible unity of races and creeds in Canada—a unity now gravely jeopardized by the character of the election campaign already developing under the political stratagems of the Rogers type.

Apart altogether from the question of the physical hardships on the "old chief" which would be entailed by a winter campaign it is the desire of Sir Wilfrid to avoid, if possible, this racial discord which might centre around his leadership, however unjustly, that is moving him to ask the party to consider his retirement. It may be noted in this connection that Sir Wilfrid has repeatedly asked to

resign ever since the election of 1911. His retention of the leadership has been solely because of ideals of public service and not because of any personal ends or ambitions. Should he decide next week to tender his resignation formally to the party, as it was informally discussed by Sir Wilfrid last night at his residence with Messrs. Pardee, Carvell, E. M. Macdonald and Hon. J. A. Calder, a party convention will be at once summoned by the Liberal whip, Mr. Pardee.

#### As to Successor.

The semi-official announcement made this morning that Sir Wilfrid contemplates retirement from the leadership has started speculations as to a prospective successor. Two names are most prominently mentioned — Hon. George P. Graham and F. B. Carvell, M. P. Mr. Graham has been Sir Wilfrid's first lieutenant for the past six years. No one could have been a more loyal or trusted lieutenant.

Both Mr. Graham and Mr. Carvell have been repeatedly asked by Sir Robert Borden during the past four months to enter a coalition government. Both voted for the military service act.

#### Ballentyne's Entry.

The first fusionist member of the Borden cabinet, Hon. C. C. Ballentyne, who succeeds Hon. Robert Rogers, is head of the Sherwin-Williams Paint Company of Montreal, a director of the Consolidated Rubber Company and of the Canadian Cement Company. He is an ex-mayor of Westmount and an ex-member of the Montreal board of harbor commissioners. He has never been actively identified with politics although he has always been regarded as a Liberal. The chief reason for his inclusion in the government seems to be his political affiliations and his reputation as a good business organizer. He describes himself in Morgan "as a believer in a thoroughly Canadian tariff" and he opposed reciprocity in 1911. He will probably seek election in the new federal constituency of the St. George division of Montreal. The inclusion of Mr. Ballentyne in the cabinet gives Quebec a third English-speaking representative with Messrs. Blondin and Sevigny left to represent the French-speaking majority. ## FRASER MILL AT EDMUNDSTON

(Financial Post.)

Good progress is reported on the bleach sulphite pulp mill being erected by Fraser Companies, Limited, the big New Brunswick lumber corporation, at Edmundston, N. B. The mill will have a capacity of 120 tons per day and will give employment to 400 hands. The plant covers six acres and consists of storage room, machine room, screen room, plow pit room, digester house, acid plant, boiler house, turbine room, wood room, machine shop and hydraulic power plant. The digester house will contain four digesters, each 17 feet in diameter and 58 feet high. The present state of construction shows the foundation complete for the whole plant, except the hydraulic power station. The brick work is completed on the storage building, machine room, screen room, digester house and acid plant. The construction on hydraulic power plant has just been started. The whole enterprise represents an investment of three million dollars.
