

FRASER MILL AT EDMUNDSTON

(Finiancial Post.)

Good progress is reported on the bleach sulphite pulp mill being erect ed by Fraser Companies, Limited, the big New Brunswick lumber corporation, at Edmundston, N. B. The mill will have a capacity of 120 tons per day and will give employment to 400 hands. The plant covers six acres and consists of storage room, machine room, screen room, plow pit room, digester house, acid plant, boiler house turbine room, wood room, machine shop and hydraulic power plant. The digester house will contain four digesters, each 17 feet in diameter and 56 feet high. The present state of construction shows the foundation complete for the whole plant, except the hydraulic power station. The brick work is completed on the stroage building, machine room, screen room, digester house and acid plant. The construction on hydraulic power plant has just been started. The whole en terprise represents an investment of three million doilars.
