Convictions Were Made.

Matter of Authority.
Dr. W. C. Kierstead a member of the faculty of the University of New Brunswick, who was in St. John yesterday on food control business, in speaking to the Telegraph of the students' trouble at that institution said: "The trouble at the U.N.B. is that the faculty regards the action of the students as opposition to its authority and of such a character that it is not desirable. I should think that the students would acknowledge this and submit to the decision of the faculty in the matter in question. When they take this attitude it will not be difficult to solve the problem. I personally have the most kindly interest in the students and hope that the matter can be fixed up."

PROPOSED THAT PROVINCE TAKE C. P. R. FARM

H. P. Timmerman, Industrial Commissioner of Railway, Before the Provincial Government.

The Provincial Government opened its regular monthly meeting last night. The meeting is being continued today. Mr. H. P. Timmerman, Industrial Commissioner of the Canadian Pacific Railway, appeared before the Government last night, together with Mr. W. R. Reek, Deputy Minister of Agriculture.

Mr. Timmerman's business was connected with a proposition of the C. P. R. that the illustration farm which has been maintained by the railway for some years at Fredericton Junction, be taken over by the province and operated in connection with the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. George M. Stearns of Lake Megantic, Que., an official of the International Paper Company, arrived in Fredericton last night and will appear before the government this afternoon in connection with certain matters.

Returned to This City.
Private Joseph Lufford of this city, who had been in Montreal for some time undergoing special treatment in a convalescent home, has returned to Fredericton.

Board of Trade Meeting.
A special meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade has been called for tonight. Among the matters which will be discussed will be the report that the Canadian Government Railway is about to curtail service on the Newcastle-Fredericton Branch and on the Transcontinental by withdrawing the train known as the "Whooper" and also the application of the New Brunswick Telephone Company to reduce the hours during which a night rate for messages can be charged. A committee of the City Council will be present to take joint action with regard to the matter of telephone rates.

PTE. ROBT. KING INVALIDED HOME, TWICE WOUNDED

Gunner D. L. Irvine Returns After Losing Leg—Private Walter Hanlon Writes From Paris.

Private Robert King of this city, arrived here last night, having been invalided home on account of wounds received in France. He is receiving a warm welcome from old friends. Private King left Canada with the 12th Battalion, being cook for the band which formerly was the 71st York Regt. Band of this city. After being with the 12th Battalion for some time he volunteered for a draft for France where he saw much service. Private King was twice wounded.

Gunner D. L. Irvine.
Gunner D. L. Irvine also arrived here last night. He served in France with the Canadian Field Artillery and lost a leg as the result of injuries received in action. He now has an artificial leg.

In Paris on Leave.
A letter received by Miss Mary Ann Hanlon of Regent street, from her nephew, Private Walter Hanlon, who has been in France for about two years, states that he recently spent ten days' leave in Paris where he witnessed the ceremony of raising the American flag for the first time over the Hotel de Ville. The band of the Garde Republicaine played the national anthems of all the Allied nations on this occasion. Private Hanlon is another former member of the 1st Battalion Band. He received serious injuries to his spine on service.
