THE FRENCH AND GERMANS IN A BLOODY CONFLICT

Huns in Great Masses Hurlled Themselves Against the French Lines and Fierce Hand to Hand Fighting Ensued--Enemy Guns Overpowered by French Artillery Which Did Terrible Execution.

With the French Army in France, Saturday, Mar. 30. (By the Associated Press.)—A great flood of German infantry flowed against the French lines today between Moreuil and Lassigny. It was purely a battle of foot soldiers. Heavy masses of Germans were hurled against the French line after only to be cast back again by counter attacks.

This was especially the case around Lassigny, the town which formed the limit of the German line before their retreat in March of last year. The battle line fluctuated severely, both sides displaying the greatest obstinacy. The French and Germans met often hand-to-hand fighting in the villages of Orvillers, Plesmont and Plessier De Roye, where bayonets and hand grenades did deadly work.

Bridges Destroyed.

The French artillery sometimes found an opportunity for getting into action. It overpowered the much weaker German guns. Apparently the enemy has not been able to bring up his big cannon, the British and French in retreating at the first rush, when the battle started ten days ago, having destroyed roads and small bridges. This prevented the bringing up of powerful German weapons and also put an obstacle in the way of bringing forward supplies.

Moreuil was the scene of some of the hardest fighting of the day. The combatants struggled in the streets until one or the other succumbed. At one point German attacking columns came under almost point blank fire of French 75's which did terrific execution and caused a panic stricken retreat of the survivors.

Many German Dead.

The line of attack was extended both northward and southward during the day. Towards evening a slight lull occurred, but onward activity was observed after dark, German reserves evidently having arrived on the scene. The ground before the French lines is covered thickly with German dead. The attackers are compelled to advance under a constant hail of bullets from cleverly placed detachments equipped with numerous machine guns, whose presence is hidden from

the view of the Germans until they come within a short distance. French aviators had virtually cleared the skies of their German adversaries, so that the attacking infantry was without the valuable assistance generally afforded from the air.

The opinion is general that the battle will be a large one, keeping up for months, with a series of pauses between the various phases. Whether the Germans will be able to demonstrate in another direction while the present struggle is progressing remains to be seen, but indications point to the utilization of a great part of their available troops in this effort.
