

THE KING CONGRATULATES FIELD MARSHALL HAIG

**His Majesty Returns From a Visit to the
Battlefront--Proud of the Unconquer-
able Spirit of the British Race--Much
Impressed With the Splendid Morale of
the Troops.**

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

London, March 31. — King George, on returning to London from his visit to the battlefront, sent a message to Field Marshal Haig in which he said: "Though for the moment our troops have been obliged by sheer weight of numbers to give some ground, the impression left on my mind is that no army could be in better heart, braver and more confident than that which you have the honor to command."

The king related how he had seen the units recently withdrawn from the front and the entraining of fresh troops, "eager to reinforce their comrades." He said he had listened with wonder as officers and men had narrated thrilling incidents of the stubborn fighting. The king also told of a visit to a casualty clearing station where "the patient cheerfulness of the wounded was equalled only by the care and gentleness of those administering to their wants."

He added: "With these experiences, short but vivid, I feel that the whole empire will join with me in expressing gratitude to your army for the successful and unswerving manner in which this formidable attack has been and continues to be dealt with."

"Anyone," King George concludes, "privileged to share these experiences would feel with me pride in the British race and in that unconquerable spirit which will, please God, bring us through our present trials. We at home must ensure that the man power is maintained adequately and that our workers, men and women,

will continue nobly to meet the demands for all necessities of war."

"Thus may you be relieved from any anxiety by which the support of our faithful and brave allies and your heroic army shall justify that inspiring determination which I found permeated all ranks."

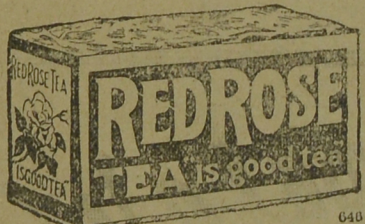

Q. 2. What was the total cost to the province of the Increased Production Convention held last spring in the City of Fredericton?

Answer—\$1,272.80.
HON. MR. MURRAY, in reply to Mr. Pinder (York):

Q. 1. What amount has been received by Mr. Peter J. Hughes, of the City of Fredericton for services on behalf of the Province since the present government came into power? Is there anything due Mr. Hughes from the province at the present time which has not yet been paid? If so, what amount?

Answer—The amount of \$213.38 has been paid Mr. P. J. Hughes on behalf of the province since the present government came into power. There is an amount of \$750. due Mr. Hughes for five months' services as acting clerk of the Executive Council, and also payment for preparing two bills, an account for which has not been rendered.

HON. MR. SMITH in reply to Mr. Smith (Carleton):

Q. 1. What game wardens were dismissed in the County of Carleton by the present government? What salary did they receive?

Answer—The following is a list of the game wardens for Carleton Co. dismissed by the present government, with their salaries per year, when employed:

Q. 2. How many game wardens have been appointed to the County of Carleton by the present government, and what is the amount paid to each, and what was the total amount paid for that service last year in Carleton Co.?

Answer—The present government has appointed for this year four game wardens for Carleton County who are now on duty. The Chief County Warden is paid \$3 per day when employed and the three other wardens each receive \$2 per day when employed. An amount of \$1,831.39 was paid to game wardens in Carleton county for the last fiscal year.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to notice of inquiry by Mr. Smith (Carleton):

Q. 1. What bridges have been repaired or are now being repaired in the Parish of Rogersville in the County of Northumberland since the present government came into power, and what were the names of the parties who performed this work, and what was the amount of wages paid to each?

Q. 2. What was the cost of material entering into the construction and from whom was it purchased?

A. The following is a list of the bridges that have been and are now being repaired in the above named parish:

Busy Hill Bridge, West Collette Bridge, Bastian Brook Bridge and Arseneau Brook Bridge.

Copies of the accounts are furnished herewith showing the names of the parties who performed the work, the amount of wages paid to each, the cost of material and the parties from whom it was purchased, with the exception of Arseneau Brook Bridge, as no pay rolls have been received to for repairs to the latter.

HON. MR. MURRAY in reply to Mr. Smith (Carleton):

Q. 1. What amount has been received by Hon. W. P. Jones for services on behalf of the Province since the present government came into power? Is there anything due Mr. Jones from the Province at the present time which has not been paid? If so, what amount?

A. The amount of \$380.15 has been paid Hon. W. P. Jones on behalf of the Province since the present government came into power. There is an account of \$103.80 which has been rendered but not yet paid, also an amount is due for services in St. John & Quebec Railway Investigation, an account for which has not been rendered.

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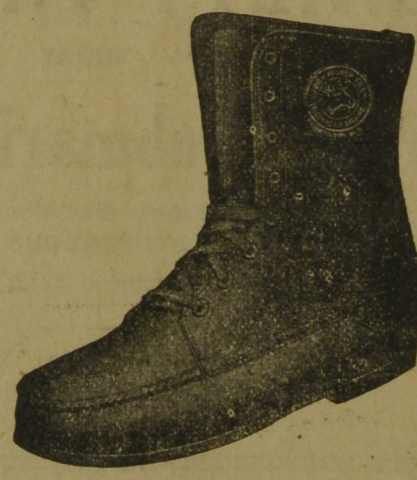
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
