**GOOD WORK ACCOMPLISHED  
BY THE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE****Summer Campaign Closes on Sept. 30---  
Over One Hundred Institutes in the  
Province -- Convention to be Held in  
Fredericton Next Week---An Attractive  
Program Arranged**

The summer campaign of the New Brunswick Women's Institutes launched in June, 1918 will practically be brought to a close September 30, 1918. Mrs. J. W. V. Lawlor, under the auspices of the Women's Institute Division, Department of Agriculture, N. B. By that time, will have visited each and every Institute throughout the Province, addressing its members and visiting public on Conversation in the broadest, truest meaning of the term. Mrs. Lawlor is a pleasing speaker, also one highly capable of bringing her audience to a clear understanding of the subject in hand. Needless to say, splendid success has followed her throughout the tour.

Two demonstrators, Miss Elizabeth Nutter and Miss Jess'e VanWart, graduates in Household Science from Acadia Seminary, Wolfville, N. S. have visited the different Institutes, demonstrating principal wheat Substitutes such as potato, oatmeal, cornmeal, buckwheat, rice, etc., used in yeast breads, quick breads, cake, etc. Institutes asking for demonstrations in Canada or any other particular subject have always had their requests granted.

Miss Alice Michaud, graduate in Household Science, of St. Paschal, Quebec has organized and demonstrated Canning and Wheat Substitution among the French Institutes. Where Institutes have been composed of both English and French members, an English and a French demonstrator have been sent together. Thus the two nationalities are represented in the work.

Up to date there are one hundred and seven branches of the Women's Institute in the Province—a increased of thirteen since July 1, 1918.

Immediately after the close of the Summer Campaign, the Provincial Convention will be held in Fredericton, N. B. A good program has been arranged and the public is cordially invited to attend the lectures which will be given in the Normal School Annex, October 1-2, 1918.

**GERMAN PAPER  
ADMITS ALLIED  
SUPERIORITY**

London, Sept. 24.—The Allied successes in France, Macedonia and Palestine have led the Cologne Gazette to an anxious consideration regarding future military developments.

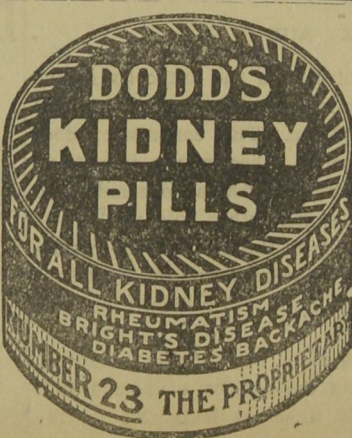
"We must do Foch the justice to say he is apparently beginning to obtain on a big scale that strategical unity he has already obtained on French soil," says this leading German newspaper, and after reviewing the situation in the various theatres of war, it contends that the prosecution from all sides of an offensive against the alliance of the Central Powers would be a master stroke. Having mentioned the unity of command and the superiority of the Allies in men and material, it continues: "We have already pointed out the enviable secrecy observed in the manufacture of armored tanks and the training of their crews, which now number not thousands, but tens of thousands. To this must be added the increase in the number of guns, mine throwers, flame producers, gas and fog ammunition and aircraft of all kinds. No proof is necessary that German industry is unable to accomplish this in similar quantities, especially as regards the armored tanks. There is no doubt that numerical superiority is on the side of the enemy and that he is bound to utilize it to the utmost."
