

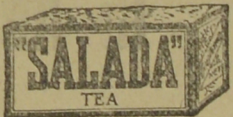

"I understand from your mother

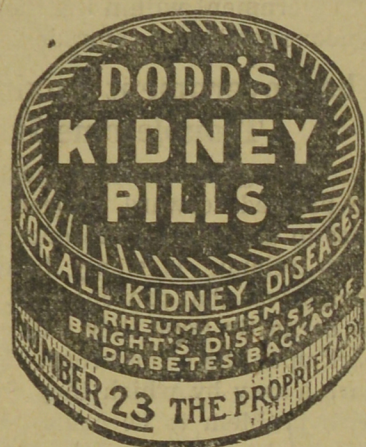
that the captain had taken several dinners at your house."

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## LATE ERNEST HUTCHINSON HAD INTERESTING CAREER

Was One of the Most Successful Business Men on the North Shore --- Was One Time a Member of the Legislature and Served in the County Council

Mr. Ernest Hutchinson, accompanied by Mr. Spurr, left by motor for South Carolina, three or four weeks ago, with the intention of spending the winter there. He had planned, two or three times previously, escaping the cold New Brunswick winter by going south but had failed to go. He arrived there safely and wrote appreciatively of the climate. But on Thursday news of his death at Columbia, S. C. came by wire. Mrs. Hutchinson was in St. John, en route to Boston, when she received the despatch. It is supposed that Mr. Hutchinson's sudden death was caused by influenza or pneumonia.

Well Known Man

Mr. Hutchinson was one of the best known sons of the Miramichi. He was a strong man in every sense of the word. He had strong opinions on all subjects and the courage of his convictions, never hesitating about expressing his opinions because they were unpopular. He carried on a successful lumber business at Douglastown for many years, and sold out his mill and land leases to the Miramichi Lumber Co. for a large sum, generally placed at \$350,000.

Mr. Hutchinson was fond of yachting in his younger days, and built a very fast motor boat a few years ago. He devoted much of his leisure of late years to motoring, having a battery of cars in his garage, and would take a car to pieces and put it together again on a rainy day, just for the fun of it. He had travelled considerably in Europe, and had brought back with him many interesting memories of foreign lands. He was an intellectual man, a great reader and an original thinker.

Former M. P. P.

Mr. Hutchinson served the County in the Legislature for eight years, and ran unsuccessfully on two occasions. He always took a deep interest in public affairs, but was not a party man.

One of Mr. Hutchinson's latest and best acts was the building of the Miramichi Hospital at Newcastle. He originated the idea of such an institution at the Shiretown and offered \$25,000 towards its erection. The structure was begun and as Mr. Hutchinson was out of business, he paid a great deal of attention to it, and soon took

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entire charge of the work and paid all the bills. He got the best of everything in the way of hospital plant, and is said to have expended about \$100,000 on the hospital. Mr. Hutchinson also built a fine public hall in Douglastown for the use of fraternal societies and the public generally.

Mr. Hutchinson was a Mason and an Oddfellow. He was the first Warden of the County, was more than once President of the Highland Society, and was a Past Master of Miramichi Lodge F. & A. M. Mr. Hutchinson leaves one son—Richard of Boston, and one daughter, Mrs. Hugh G. Moncrieff of Winnipeg. He was 71 years of age.

The remains will, of course, be brought home for burial.
