SOME LANDMARKS OF THE BIG ALLIED OFFENSIVE

American Correspondent Writes of the
Towns of Amiens, Montdidier and Can-
tigny---Many of the Stores in the Busi-
ness Section of Chateau Thierry Were
Smashed --- Cathedral Escaped Almost
Unscratched

With the American Army in France Aug. 16.—Returning from the now swampy valley of the Somme to the more rocky heights of the Vesle—from one American battlefield to the other—one may pass three landmarks of the decisive days of July and August, when the Americans, shoulder to shoulder with the French and British, took an important part in what may prove to be a great change in the face of destiny—Amiens, Montdidier and Cantigny.

Amiens and Montdidier are larger than Cantigny, and this tiny village is symbolic of the small beginning we made there last May and the forerunner of the greater effort and the greater results that came after it.

It seems a far cry from Amiens to that little Picardy hamlet for Amiens is a goodsized manufacturing city—and will be that again soon. Amiens like Chateau Thierry, isn't wiped out, although many of the stores in the main business section have been smashed. Thus, whereas one big department store was completely burned out, evidently by fire caused by the explosion of some enemy shell or bomb next door a cafe, bearing the sign "Charles's American Bar," is practically intact.

Cathedral Hit Four Times

The luckiest thing of all is that the Cathedral escaped almost unscratched although it was hit four times. One shell badly smashed the organ, another wrecked a group of saints near the altar and the others also caused some damage, but the altar itself was not touched, and most of the fine windows were unbroken. All of the precious vessels, ornaments and paintings were removed in the early days of the German menace and are safe but it is a shock to see the vaulted interior of this sacred place coated deeply with dust and to see the fragments of the roof lying around outside. It is a miraculous thing that although the gray stone walls were nicked in many places by shell fragments, the magnificent base relief at the main portal, facing Place Notre Dame, was not touched—it represents Judgment Day. The fact that much of the fine stone carving of the cathedral had been swathed and protected by sandbags may explain in part its gratifying state of preservation.

Montdidier in Ruins

Montdidier is a ghastly contrast. Its gray buildings, ranged terracelike along the shelving valley of the little River Dom, are shattered and roofless. They look like staring eye-sockets of a human skull, and one instinctively expects to see bats flitting about. Parts of walls are standing, but parts only. The streets are piled with debris. There is a church in Montdidier—or there was one—the Church of St. Peter.

The church is half ruined, and beneath every altar in its deep cellar the Boche had established a telephone station. The tombs in the cemetery were smashed by shells and in some the coffins are exposed. The angels

who supported the columns of the doorway of the Hotel de Ville are wingless now and legless, typical of the torture which has been inflicted on what was once a pretty town with thousands of homes.

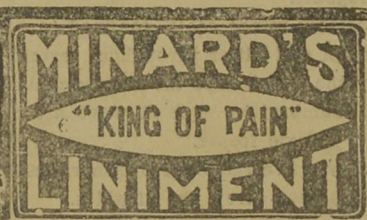
