BRITAIN'S PRODIGIOUS EFFORTS TO WIN THE WAR

Recounts Aid to America

"Then we have in the three million all the men who build and repair ships naval and mercantile. I wonder if you have ever thought who it is that keeps the American destroyers fit for sea. Our shipyard workers could tell you who it is that keeps those serving on this side of the Atlantic in repair, and our tube and steel mills could tell you where the materials come from. But not only American destroyers have to be repaired. All the British naval vessels now on escort duties with the American troop convoys have to be repaired, and all the aircraft that pilot in the convoys have to be maintained.

"The bringing of America's manhood to Europe imposes a great strain on our resources, far greater perhaps than many Americans have realized. We do not begrudge it.

"Then there is the question of the equipment of your armies. Guns, rifles clothes, horses, are being provided in vast quantities from British resources. Again we do not begrudge it but it is limiting our direct effort.

"But not only the American army, the armies of France, of Italy, of Greece of Portugal, the armies of our great dominions of India, these all look to little England for many things they require. Coal is wanted. Send to England! Boots, guns, shells tanks, Send to England! Once yet again we do not begrudge it but it absorbs man power.

"And then our own needs. The fleet that is the backbone of the whole alliance! Its requirements are vast. New ships have to be built. Old ships have to be repaired. Guns are wanted torpedoes, range finders, everything, literally from a needle to an anchor. And the army! It eats supplies and consumes munitions on a colossal scale. Think of its guns and its rifles and its projectiles of all sorts. Then the air force! Its requirements are legion, and again legion.

Only Rivalry is of Effort

"Yes the men of England are all in it, and so are all the women. We rejoice too, in the knowledge of the colossal effort of America. I myself know parts of America very well; and I know that when America puts her hand to the plough she will never look back until the furrow is driven true

and straight. We have only one rivalry with America, and that is that she does not do more to win the war per head of population than we are doing and if she does—well good luck to her!—we will take off our hats all right. We are out to win. Let us see who can do the most for the common cause. We had the start all right, but America is still fresh, whereas we are not so fresh as we were."

NEW FACTS ON FEEDING CATTLE

Cattle feeders will be interested in the following facts which are contained in a bulletin recently issued by the University of Wisconsin relative to successful methods of feeding cattle.

Balanced rations are sometimes deficient in the elements which make for the best growth of animals. Reproduction is often affected by the ration fed to the cow.

A good roughage, preferably a legume hay, should be fed with wheat grain or its by-products to overcome their bad effects on reproduction. Even with a good roughage, wheat or its by-products should not be fed continuously too liberally or the offspring will be weak.

Wheat grain with wheat straw ration is in most cases fatal to both growth and reproduction. It will produce weak or dead calves.

Due to its low mineral content, the over-abundance of a material like wheat straw in the ration is an important factor in premature births.

Rations producing early delivery of offspring usually lead to the failure of the animal to clean properly, with its attendant dangers or infection. Poor roughage, such as the straws, often lead to this condition.

A complete ration cannot be made from the oat plant. Exclusive use of oat straw as a roughage for breeding cows will likewise produce premature, weak or dead offspring. Corn stover, corn silage or legume hay should replace part of the oat straw.

A complete ration can be made from the corn plant. It will give normal growth and reproduction.

NEWSPAPERMEN ENTERTAINED AT MANCHESTER

Saw Ship Canal and Wonderful Docks and Visited a Canadian Discharge Depot.

London, Aug. 13.—W. R. McCurdy, of Halifax, who is one of the deputations of Canadian newspapermen at present touring Great Britain at the invitation of the British government, sends the following message:

"On our way from London to Manchester, where the Canadian newspaper men were entertained to dinner by the directors of the Manchester Ship Canal, and afterwards shown over the canal and wonderful docks built by the enterprise and capital of the people of Manchester, the Canadians spent a whole day at Buxton on the beautiful highlands of Derbyshire, where the Canadian discharge depot is located, and at Granville, where the Canadian special hospital is. The situation is ideal in summer and delightful in winter, and because of its great altitude more like the climate of Canada than other parts of England. No Canadian soldier returns home without passing through Buxton discharge and the visitors were impressed by the admirable and complete arrangements for the rapid handling of soldiers.

"There were 1,800 at the depot the day we spent there. Lieut. Colonel Paul Hanson presided at the luncheon which was given in honor of the visitors, who spent several hours in looking over the establishment and its facilities for quickly and efficiently carrying on its work. Shortly after dinner speeches were made by Lieut. Col. Hanson, Hon. Frank Carroll, of Quebec, and Mr. J. H. Woods, of Calgary.

"As an example of how well disciplined the depot is, the fire alarm was sounded shortly before midnight and less than eight minutes later every one of the eighteen hundred soldiers were cut out of the building. It was stated that they could have made much better time had the occasion demanded it.

"At Granville the special Canadian hospital under the direction of Lieut. Colonel Clark was also gone over by the visitors, who found many among the patients whom they knew, and also were glad to see friends so recently from Canada. Colonels Hanson and Clarke were warmly congratulated on their work."

"Well it's this way," said dear William softly. "I was listening to a recruiting officer's description of life in the army!"

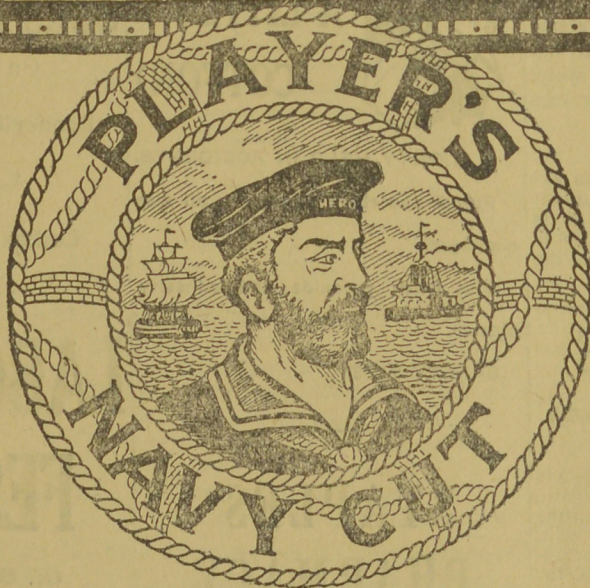
