ALLIED SUBJECTS TO BE LIABLE TO SERVICE

Ottawa, Aug. 14—Negotiations have been opened which aim to bring practically all allied subjects in Canada within the dragnet of compulsory military service. With the exception of Americans, a subject of one of the allied governments, resident in Canada, does not come within the scope of the M. S. A. His position is privileged. If he fails to respond to a call for service from his own country he is a deserter so far as that country is concerned and is liable to be shot during capture. As long as he remains in Canada, he cannot be proceeded against. Nor is he at present liable to service under the M. S. A.

The present negotiations are being conducted in London. Sir Robert Borden, it is understood, is endeavoring to press the matter forward, particularly in its regard to allied subjects resident in Canada.

BOLSHEVIKI GOVERNMENT ONLY A DISORDERLY MOB

Lenine and Trotsky in the Pay of the German Government---The Czarina an Accessory to the Death of Lord Kitchener ---Told Kaiser of His Departure From England

Toronto, Ont. Aug. 12—"Is the Bolshevik Government a sincere Government?"

"No. It is no government at all; it is an insurgent, disorderly mob, which by foul means, has seized the reins of power in Russia."

The above question was put by a representative of The Globe, and the answer was given by Commissioner Mapp of the Salvation Army, who established the first Salvation Army headquarters in liberated Russia, after the dethronement of Czarism, and who returned to Toronto yesterday.

Commissioner Mapp went to Russia in the early days of the revolution, when the law of religious liberty was proclaimed. Hitherto the Salvation Army had not been allowed in the country. When he arrived in Petrograd he found the populace in a state of intoxication over their new found liberty. The country was in a state of chaos, and everybody did absolutely what they liked, said the Commissioner.

"Did not the Bolshevik Government serve a useful purpose in restoring order?" asked the Globe.

German Agents

"The Bolshevik leaders, Lenine and Trotsky, were paid by the German Government, and their whole object was to overthrow the revolution. The Bolshevik policy is a German policy it is Government by armed force."

"Would Russia have been better under the Czar than under the Bolshevik?"

"No replied the Commissioner, 'As bad as the present state is, it is nothing like what it would have been if Czarism had been sustained.'"

CZARINA ACCESSORY

The Commissioner went into some details regarding German intrigue which prevailed in the old Russian Court. He declared that Lord Kitchener's death was directly due to the Czarina, who was a pro-German. He

stated that when the Czar received a message that Kitchener was about to leave for Russia, the Czarina immediately informed the Kaiser, with the result that the Hampshire was sunk in the North Sea.

Commissioner Mapp believes the downfall of the Bolshevik Government is coming, and it will be brought about by the steady encroachment of the allied forces from the east and the south. He stated that the Bolshevik only represented one-tenth of the power of Russia. He believed that Russia would come back stronger and healthier than before her present trouble. There were already signs of awakening in the Czechoslovak movement, and in the assassination of German dictators.

"There is an element in Russia that says 'No' to German domination," said Commissioner Mapp.



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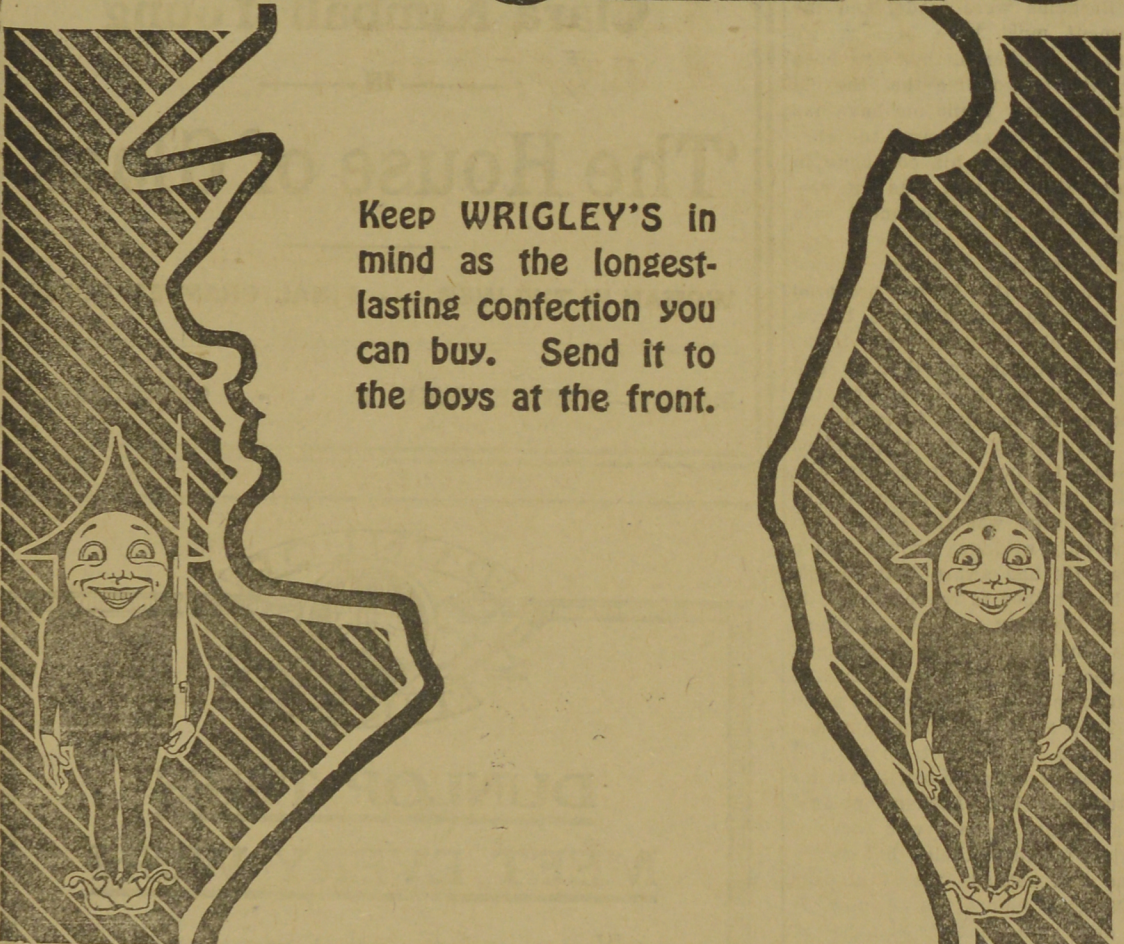
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
