

ESTABLISHMENT OF FLOUR MILLS CONSIDERED

SUITABLE LOCATIONS TO BE SELECTED

Minister of Agriculture and
Deputy to Visit Upper St.
John Valley in That
Connection.

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, and his deputy Mr. W. R. Reek will leave tomorrow on a tour of the upper St. John Valley for the purpose of looking over the situation in regard to the establishment of flour mills to grind the increased wheat crop of the Province. The intention is to have the mills located in places where they will be most convenient for the people of the wheat growing sections. Hon. Mr. Tweeddale expects to get in touch with a number of men interested in this matter. The usual bonus is offered by the provincial government for the establishment of such mills.

In recent years the type of mill used for the manufacture of flour has changed considerably. What is wanted in the rural districts of New Brunswick is mills with capacities of twenty-five to fifty barrels of flour per day.
