## TERMS OF THE ARMISTICE GIVEN TO THE PUBLIC

**Huns Must Immediately Evacuate Invaded Countries—Great Quantity of Equipment to be Surrendered by the Enemy—Inhabitants to be Amply Protected—Prisoners to be Repatriated at Once—Brest-Litovsk Treaty to be Abandoned—Many Stern Requirements.**

Washington, Nov. 11—The terms of the armistice with Germany were read to congress by President Wilson at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Assembled in the hall of the house, where nineteen months ago senators and representatives heard the president ask for the declaration of war they today heard him speak the words which herald the coming of peace.

The strictly military terms of the armistice are embraced in eleven specifications which include the evacuation of all invaded territories, the withdrawal of the German troops from the left bank of the Rhine and the surrender of all supplies of war.

The terms also provide for the abandonment by Germany to the treaties of Bucharest and Brest-Litovsk.

These terms are in part as follows: The cessation of operations by land and in the air, six hours after the signature of the armistice.

Immediate evacuation of invaded countries; Belgium, France, Alsace-Lorraine, Luxemburg, so ordered as to become completed within fourteen days from the signature of the armistice.

German troops which have not left the above mentioned territories within the period fixed, will become prisoners of war. Occupation by the Allied and the United States forces jointly will keep pace with the evacuation in these areas. All movements of evacuation and occupation will be regulated in accordance with a note annexed to the stated terms.

Repatriation beginning at once and to be completed within fourteen days of all inhabitants of the countries above mentioned, including hostages and persons under trial or convicted. Surrender in good condition by the German armies of the following equipments: Five thousand guns (two thousand five hundred heavy, two thousand five hundred field, thirty thousand machine guns. Three thousand minen-wafer. Two thousand aeroplanes, fighters, bombers—firstly D. seventy-three's and night bombing machines) The above to be delivered to the Allies and the United States troops in accordance with the detailed conditions laid down in the annexed note.

### Evacuation to the Rhine

The evacuation by the German armies of the countries on the left bank of the Rhine. These countries on the left bank of the Rhine shall be administered by the local authorities under the control of the Allied and United States armies of occupation.

Evacuation by the enemy of the Rhine lands shall be so ordered as to be completed within a further period of eleven days in all nineteen days after the signature of the armistice. All movements of evacuation and occupation will be regulated according to the note annexed.

In all territory evacuated by the enemy there shall be no evacuation of inhabitants, no damage or harm shall be done to the persons or property of the inhabitants. No destruction of any kind to be committed.

All barges taken from the Allies shall be restored to them.

An immediate repatriation without reciprocity according to detailed conditions, which shall be fixed, of all

Allied and United States prisoners of war. The Allied powers and the United States shall be able to dispose of these prisoners as they wish.

Sick and wounded who cannot be removed from evacuated territory will be cared for by German personnel who will be left on the spot with medical material required.

### Eastern Frontiers

All German troops at present in any territory which before the war belonged to Russia, Roumania or Turkey shall withdraw within the frontiers of Germany as they existed on August 1, 1914.

Evacuation by German troops to begin at once and all German instructors prisoners and civilians as well as military agents now on the territory of Russia (as defined before 1914) to be recalled.

German troops to cease at once all requisitions and seizures and any other undertaking with a view to obtaining supplies intended for Germany in Roumania and Russia, (as defined on August 1, 1914.)

Abandonment of the treaties of Bucharest and Brest-Litovsk and of the supplementary treaties.

The Allies shall have free access to the territories evacuated by the Germans on their eastern frontier either through Danzig or by the Vistula in order to convey supplies to the populations of those territories or for any other purpose.

### Financial Conditions

The following financial conditions are required: Reparation for damage done. While such armistice lasts no public securities shall be removed by the enemy which can serve as a pledge to the Allies for the recovery or reparation for war losses. Immediate restitution of the cash deposit in the national bank of Belgium, and in general immediate return of all documents, specie, stocks, shares, paper money together with plant for the issue of same, touching public or private interests in the invaded countries. Restitution of the Russian and Roumanian gold yielded to Germany or taken by that power. This gold to be delivered in trust to the Allies under the signature of peace.

### Naval Conditions

Immediate cessation of all hostilities at sea and definite information to be given as to the location and movements of all German ships. Notification to be given neutrals that the freedom of navigation in all territorial waters is given to the naval and mercantile marines of the Allied and associated powers, all questions on neutrality to be waved.

TWO FIFTH PAGE rEreBb . . . . . All naval and mercantile marine prisoners of war of the Allied and associated powers in German hands to be returned without reciprocity.

Surrender to the Allies and the United States of America of one hundred and sixty German submarines (including all submarines, cruisers and mine-laying submarines, with their complete armament and equipment in ports which will be specified by the Allies and the United States of America. All other submarines to be paid off and completely disarmed and placed under the supervision of the Allied powers and the United States of America.

The Allies and the United States of America shall have the right to sweep up all mine fields and obstructions laid by Germany outside German territorial waters and the positions of these are to be indicated.

Freedom of access to and from the Baltic to be given to the naval and mercantile marines of the Allied and associated powers.


The existing blockade conditions set up by the Allied and associated powers are to remain unchanged and all German merchant ships found at sea are to remain liable to capture.

All naval aircraft are to be concentrated and immobilized in German bases to be specified by the Allies and the United States of America.

No destruction of ships or of material to be permitted before evacuation, surrender or restoration.

The German government will notify the neutral governments of the world, and particularly the governments of Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland, that all restrictions placed on the trading of their vessels with


