REMOVING STAINS.

Tried and Proved Methods for Removing Many Kinds of Stains from Clothing and Fabrics.

Always try the simple method first. Consider the kind of fabric that is stained and then the type of stain. If the material is colored, test a sample piece of material to see if it will stand the proposed treatment.

Some of the more common stains may be removed by the following agents:

Cream—Cold water, then warm water and soap.

Blood—Lukewarm water (hot water sets the stain).

Fruit—Boiling water, borax for stubborn stains. Javelle water is often necessary for peach stains if alcohol fails.

Grass—Cold water, no soap. Alcohol or ether for unwashable materials.

Grease (oil)—Lard, then warm water and soap. Carbon tetrachlorid for silks, woollens, etc.

Grease (food)—Warm water and soap.

Meat juice—Warm water and soap.

Wine—Salt and boiling water.

Mildew—If fresh, cold water and sunlight, or juice of lemon, salt and sunlight.

Perspiration—Soap and water and sunlight for white washable goods.

Javelle water for white linens and cottons. Dilute sodium hydro-sulphate and water for silks and wool.

TIMELY TIPS

Boys' boots can be made almost waterproof by rubbing often with melted mutton fat and vaseline; leave in a warm place until it dries in.

Milk can be heated very quickly by putting it in a hot oven in a covered dish.

Boil out a pair of old tan stockings and use the water to renew the color of khaki pants and blouses.

A piece of thin silk put into the heels of silk stockings will save them wonderfully.

Old stocking caps are fine to put on little feet at bedtime in cold weather.

Get into the habit of turning the broom around in your hands while you sweep, to save wearing it one-sided.

Soak underwear, shirts and overalls that are oil-stained in hot water to which one-half cupful of gasoline has been added.

Gasoline will remove tar, chewing gum, fly paper, or the oil that is used on the streets from clothes and carpets and leaves no stain.
