AN IMPORTANT CONFERENCE GOING ON AT OTTAWA

New Brunswick Ministers are Putting It Up Strong to the Federal Authorities—Eastern Provinces Want Additional Subsidies if Federal Domain is Turned Over to the Western Provinces—The Valley Railway Proposal Under Consideration—Canada to Share in Peace Deliberations.

Ottawa, Nov. 19—The provincial premiers and ministers spent the afternoon in conference in the senate chambers over the question of handing over the natural resources in the prairie provinces, now held by the federal government to the ownership and control of the provincial administrations. The western provinces want the whole federal domain turned over to them and to keep in addition the extra federal subsidies now granted to Manitoba Saskatchewan and Alberta in lieu of lands.

The other provinces have no objection to this provided they are compensated by way of increased subsidies for the handing over of their interest in the federal domain.

The maritime province delegations headed by Premier Foster, Murray and Arsenault, are pressing vigorously for a larger proportion of the taxes collected by the federal government. Their contention is that provincial taxation sources are limited by the British North America Act; that federal revenues have greatly increased that the dominion government is encroaching on the provincial taxation field as for instance in connection with income taxation; that the cost of administration has greatly increased and generally that the needs of the provinces demands larger revenues. The western representatives while not actively supporting the demands of the eastern men for increased subsidies, will raise no objection so long as the easterners do not object to the transfer of lands. This was the general situation when the conference adjourned this evening.

The proposal of the eastern provinces is in a general way that the annual provincial subsidies be increased by five millions of which \$2,800,000 should be divided between Ontario and Quebec and \$2,200,000 among the three maritime provinces.

New Brunswick's Proposals

The New Brunswick delegation, which consists of Premier Foster, Hon. Messrs Tweeddale, Robinson and Veniot, E. S. Carter and Chief Engineer Foss of the St. John Valley Railway are formally presenting to the government the proposal that the dominion take over the railway as a part of the government system and relieve the province of its liability therein. This afternoon Messrs Carter and Foss had a conference with Mayor Graham Bell, deputy minister of railways with reference to the question. They were promised that the new government railway board of directors would soon go to the maritime provinces and make an inspection trip over the Valley Railway.

The value of the road as a part of the government system could then be appraised and a recommendation made to the government. The New Brunswick representatives believe that the case they have presented is so strong that the government here must recognize its equity and justice.

Hon. Mr. Veniot is also arranging with the minister of railways to reopen negotiations for the acquirement of the Caraque branch line.

Premier Foster tonight said that he had been consulted in regard to the proposed appointment of A. P. Barnhill of St. John as a director of the

government railways and had approved of the choice.

Hon. Messrs Carvell and Foster are confident that the interests of the province will be amply safeguarded in his hands.

When parliament meets the government will ask for legislation giving parliament's sanction to the placing of the Intercolonial under the control of the C. N. R. board of directors.

Sir Thomas White

Sir Thomas White in extending a welcome to the visiting ministers said they would be called upon to consider "questions of high national importance." He said it would have been a pleasure for Sir Robert Borden to have received and welcomed the delegates but he had been called overseas to confer with the imperial government and the representatives of the dominions of the empire in regard to matters which would be taken up at the peace conference.

In the deliberations of the peace conference, Canada, as a member of the British empire and as a belligerent, was rightly entitled to share.

Sir Thomas referred to the recent developments in connection with the war as startling and dramatic. "Almost in a moment" he said "we find ourselves relieved of the problems of war and face to face with as great, if not greater problems of peace. On Monday last, we entered the period of reconstruction. For us in Canada these problems are many and grave. There is the problem of wisely meeting the dislocation of business which must result from the transformation of war to a peace basis and the readjustment of our industry to meet the altered conditions."

Sir Thomas then referred to the coming to an end of the making of munitions, saying that every possible effort must be made to replace this business with a larger volume related to reconstruction. In this work the provincial governments would undoubtedly co-operate with the federal government as it was important that we should insure a continuation of profitable employment to labor."

MARRIED MEN WILL FIRST BE DEMOLISHED

London, Nov. 18—Married men and those who have seen long service in the British armies will receive first consideration in the demobilization of British fighting forces, says Christopher Addison, Minister of Reconstruction. "Pivotal" men he said, would come back early.

The demobilization, said the Minister, should be so conducted that millions of men in the navy and army would have an early opportunity of employment. Accordingly a plan arranged on industrial requirements had been prepared.

As men are demobilized they will be reemployed in the various industries from which they were withdrawn to enter the army. There will be special facilities giving access to the land, said Dr. Addison. Gardens or larger plots will be provided.

Councils composed of employers and working men have been organized in forty or fifty different trades. Already these bodies are removing sources of irritation and bringing a spirit of solidarity, a better spirit than prevailed under former agreements, said the Minister.

Inasmuch as the necessity for producing as much food as possible will not end with the war, Dr. Addison said he believed some control over the use of the land would continue to be exercised by the government. Great Britain should manufacture nitrates for manures on a large scale.

The Minister declared that unless care was exercised there would be a great deal of speculation while the demobilization of the army was in progress and prices might advance to the great detriment of industry.

AN AIRPLANE TRIP

Paris, Nov. 19—A huge airplane carrying thirty-five passengers, flew over Paris yesterday. The machine started from Combes Laville, forty miles from the capital, and returned without a hitch.

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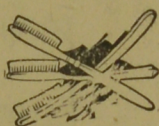
