MAY ADOPT GENERAL SCHEME FOR SAVING OF DAYLIGHT

Joint Action of the United States and Canadian Governments May be Taken---All Clocks May be Turned Backward in the Spring--Need of Greater use of Daylight is Imperative--Interprovincial Conference

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—It is probable that a continental daylight saving scheme will be effected for the coming summer by joint action of the Canadian and United States governments.

It is understood that negotiations are now in progress between the Ottawa and Washington governments looking to the joint inauguration next May or June, of daylight saving though the simple process of turning all clocks in Canada and the United States forward one hour.

Daylight saving schemes have been tried locally in a number of Canadian cities during the past two years, but to secure satisfactory working it is recognized that a general national and international observance is necessary. The need for the greater use of daylight during the long days of summer is rendered the more imperative this year because of the necessity for greater agricultural production, the saving of fuel used for lighting plants, etc.

Canada will adopt the scheme if the United States decides to go in for it also.

The conference of provincial premiers and ministers with the federal government here next week will, it is expected, result in a scheme of land settlement involving handing over to the prairie provinces by the Dominion of the ownership and control of their natural resources. Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta have for many years past pressed for their final inheritance of the crown lands and minerals now vested in the federal government. The promise that this would be given them was made by Sir Robert Borden in 1911, but was never fulfilled. One reason was political. There were Liberal governments in power in Winnipeg, Regina and Edmonton, and a Conservative government at Ottawa. Control of lands, homesteading, etc., meant political influence and patronage.

The advent of Union government and the entry of Hon. Messrs. Sifton and Calder into the ministry, changed the viewpoint at Ottawa.

Provincial Subsidies. The conference will also deal with the question of provincial subsidies. The turning over of the lands to the prairie provinces will necessitate a general readjustment, since special grants were allowed to them in lieu of ownership and control of natural resources.

The financial question also will have to be dealt with, in regard to new forms of federal taxation to meet

wor debt requirements. Direct taxation by the federal government must be continued, but it is desirable that it should not conflict with provincial forms of direct taxation.

Some agreement will be sought as to the various fields to be left free for the provincial and the federal tax collectors.

ARIZONA MAN UNDER ARREST

Charged With Assisting Alien Enemy Who Escaped from Halifax, N. S.

Phoenix, Ariz., Feb. 6.—G. A. Streitz, vice president of the National Bank of Arizona, and Richard Partham, wealthy business man of this city, both American citizens were taken into custody tonight by United States officers on the charge of aiding the escape of an interned enemy alien.

It is charged the men gave financial aid to a fugitive from an internment camp at Halifax, named Titterman, who came here seeking employment, and who disappeared before officers arrived from Halifax.

REQUEST OF RETAIL MEN NOT HEED

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The request of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada to have the dates for fuel controller's closing down order changed from Saturday, Sunday and Monday next to Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, was not acceded to by Mr. C. W. Peterson, the deputy fuel controller, who heard a deputation at noon today.

Mr. Peterson pointed out that to change the order now would cause more confusion. In fixing the order for Saturday, Sunday and Monday, they had taken into consideration the wage earners who would lose a half day's pay less. He also thought that if all retailers observed the order there would be no hardship on any particular firm.

SUPPLY OF CORN FROM THE U. S.

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The food controller announced today that arrangements had been made with the authorities at Washington under which the United States war trade board has apportioned to Canada sufficient corn to meet the monthly requirements of this country. The corn will be moved just as quickly as transportation situation will permit. The bureau of licenses of the food controller's office in turn, has apportioned part of this corn among Canadian importers, in accordance with their monthly needs, so that in future these importers will not be required to secure a separate import permit for each purchase.

THE YUKON ELECTION

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—Claiming that the soldiers' vote was all cast before nomination day in the Yukon, and that they could not know who the candidates were, Mr. Fred B. Congdon, Liberal Unionist candidate in the Yukon, raises the point that the votes of the fighting men should not be counted. The matter is being considered by the general returning officer.

LOBSTERS AND SHAD IN DANGER

St. John, N. B., Feb. 6.—Fears that both the shad and lobster fisheries will come to an end unless preventive measures are adopted were expressed at the meeting of the international commission here this morning. Chief Justice Hazen concurred in this view.

The morning session completed the hearing and the next will be held in Seattle on April 24.
