OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

POTATOES TO SAVE WHEAT.

Potatoes are a splendid food, one that most people like, and they are not expensive. One medium sized potato gives you as much starch as two ordinary slices of bread. When you have potatoes on the table go slow on the bread.

Best Mashed Potatoes.

Peel the boiled potatoes, mash and beat until very light, adding salt, butter or oleomargarine and hot milk, a half cup of milk to six potatoes. If dinner is not ready to serve, pile lightly in a pan and set in the oven to brown.

Potato Sausages.

One cup mashed potatoes, one cup of ground nuts, fish or meat, one egg, well beaten, one and a half teaspoonfuls salt, one-eighth teaspoonful pepper; salt pork, bacon or other fat.

Mix the mashed potatoes and seasoning with the ground nuts, fish or meat. Add beaten egg. Form into little cakes or sausages, roll in flour and place in greased pan with a small piece of fat or salt pork on each sausage. Bake in a fairly hot oven until brown.

Potato Cornmeal Muffins.

Two teaspoonfuls fat, one table-spoonful sugar, one egg, well beaten, one cup milk, one cup mashed potatoes, one cup cornmeal, four teaspoonfuls baking powder, one teaspoonful salt. Mix in order given. Bake forty minutes in hot oven. This makes 12 delicious muffins.

SOME HELPFUL RECIPES.

Carrot honey is made by mixing the following ingredients: One pint of grated raw carrots, two cupfuls of white corn syrup, the juice of two lemons and the grated rind of one. It is heated slowly, allowed to simmer until thick and clear, and then sealed with paraffine. This is delicious as a filling for brown bread sandwiches.

To clarify fats from meat so that they may be sweet and clear, chop the pieces up fine and melt them in a double boiler with sour milk. Use one cupful of milk to two pounds of fat. Stir and strain through clean cloth. The milk sweetens the fat and the curd remains on the cloth.

Fig Roll.

One cupful of figs chopped fine, two cupfuls of bread crumbs, one cupful of honey, half a cupful of suet chopped fine, two eggs, the grated rind and the juice of one lemon, one tablespoonful of molasses, one teaspoonful of grated nutmeg, half a cupful of flour, and milk enough to make a stiff batter. Steam for three hours.

SOCIALIST GIVES VIEWS ON THE STRIKE

Amsterdam, Feb. 6.—Before a court martial, Deputy William Dittman, an independent socialist, according to the *Koelnische Zeitung*, ascribed the strike movement in Germany to reaction against the maintenance of a state of siege and the machinations of the fatherland party. The accused deputy denied that he promoted the strike, and declared it was only a demonstration against peace by militarism and in favor of peace by understanding. "If the German government had entered into negotiations as requested," Dittman said, according to the newspaper, "the strike would have lasted only three days. The intellectual organizer of the strike was Admiral Von Tirpitz."

The strike movement had no connection with the Russian revolution, Dittman said.

Phillip Scheidemann, the majority socialist leader, corroborated Dittman's testimony that the strike was in favor of a peace by agreement and that it had no connection with affairs in Russia.

Deputy Dittman was sentenced to five years confinement for inciting to high treason and was given two months additional for resisting police.

Mr. C. T. Nisbet of Sussex, arrived in the city Tuesday night.
