

VICTORY LOAN SALESMEN HEAR FINE ADDRESS

FRANK STOCKDALE AT
THE BOARD OF TRADE

Points in Connection with the
Bonds — J. M. Robinson
and J. D. Palmer Also
Heard.

A very interesting meeting was held at the Board of Trade rooms on Queen Street last evening. Mr. Frank Stockdale of Chicago addressed the meeting on Salesmanship and on the coming Victory Loan Issue about to be launched. Mr. Stockdale gave three chief reasons why men and women should buy the Victory Loan bonds. The first reason he gave was that all the money raised would be spent in Canada. This would increase trade and keep a large amount of money in the country. The second reason he gave was that from the point of self-interest it was a good investment. He said that no doubt this would be the last issue free from taxation and would be greatly in demand by executors of estates and trustees as a safe investment. Another reason he gave was that the prosperity of the country depended on more money being circulated among the farmers, merchants and manufacturers. If there were no other reasons the patriotic impulse should cause the Canadian people to buy the bonds.

The meeting was open to the public and numerous salesmen of the Victory Loan Bonds who were present received some very interesting ideas as to the selling of the bonds. Mr. J. M. Robinson gave a short talk and was followed by a short address from the chairman Mr. J. D. Palmer after which the meeting closed. The interest of the public in the address of Mr. Stockdale was shown by the large crowd present.

Because of meetings being prohibited on account of Spanish Influenza, it is probable that Mr. Stockdale's address will be distributed in pamphlet form.

The Influenza Outbreak

ANOTHER CASE OF INFLUENZA IN THE CITY

REPORT MADE TO BOARD
OF HEALTH YESTERDAY

Four Cases at Hawkshaw--Rev
Father Cormier and Harry
Ryan, Both Known
Here, Dead.

Spanish Influenza appears to be increasing in New Brunswick although Fredericton and the immediate vicinity is not much affected yet. Two cases now exist in this city another being reported yesterday in addition to Miss Flewelling. A message from Hawkshaw states that four cases in one family exist there. Tracey and other places in Sunbury County are reported to have large numbers of cases. There have been no deaths in this vicinity from the disease but in other parts of the province people formerly residing here have succumbed to the disease.

Closing Regulations in Effect

The order of the Provincial Health Department closing all places of public gathering went into effect today in Fredericton. All schools, places of amusement and clubrooms are included. The A. & B. Club was closed last night the Board of Health taking the ground that it was included under the act.

Panic to be Avoided

The public is warned to avoid panic. There is little doubt that many cases which are not Spanish Influenza are unofficially reported as such. On the other hand many physicians are classifying cases under their notice as ordinary lagrippe no matter how severe the attack.

Deaths of People Known Here

Two people well known here have died elsewhere in the province from attacks of this disease. They are Rev. Dominique Cormier at one time curate of St. Anthony's Church, Devon, and Harry Ryan formerly of this city. Rev. Father Cormier died at Haute Aboujagne near Shediac. He was known to have a severe cold but his illness was not thought to be serious.

Harry Ryan was proprietor and manager of the St. John Garage, St. John, where he had resided for some years. He was in Fredericton during the harness meet last week. He was taken ill early Wednesday morning and died last night. He was twenty-five years old. Surviving relatives are his father Daniel Ryan of this city, five brothers and three sisters, Fred of St. John, Ernest of Fredericton, Lloyd with the C. E. F. at Quebec, Jack of Halifax and Royal of Fredericton. Mrs. Harry Day of Fredericton and the Misses Isa and Mamie of Fredericton. He was well known in Fredericton and the news of his sudden death came as a shock to all his friends.

Shale is Available

Mr. R. H. Simonds, Fuel Controller of this city states that a quantity of Albert Shale is available for this city to test as fuel. Tests have been conducted in St. John and proved very successful but the shale can not be burned alone. It gives such a heat that it has to be mixed with coal or other fuel. He states that the price in St. John is \$6.50 a ton and there is no doubt but that it can be obtained for the same price here.

CASUALTIES IN THIS SECTION INCREASE

SERG. HARRY RUSSELL IN
MANCHESTER HOSPITAL

Private G. Parke of Burt's
Corner, Missing Since Sept.
26th—Zealand Station
Casualties.

More casualties from this section of the province are reported today. Sergt. Harry Russell of this city who has been serving with the artillery for upwards of three years is reported wounded. Two men from Zealand Station are in the list, one died of wounds and the other is a prisoner of war. Lieut. C. P. Inches a former undergraduate of the University of New Brunswick is reported wounded.

Sergt. Harry Russell

News was received by Mrs. Bessie Russell of Northumberland Street this morning that her husband Sergeant Harry Russell was admitted to No 2 Western General Hospital at Manchester, England on October 3rd suffering from gunshot wounds in the left arm. Sergeant Russell enlisted and went overseas as a private with the 23rd Battery. On reaching England he was transferred to the 6th Howitzer Brigade with which he served for some time in France, where he won his stripes.

Died of Wounds

The name of E. B. Crouse of Zealand Station is reported in this morning's casualty list as died of wounds.

Prisoner of War

H. B. Estey of Zealand Station is reported in this morning's casualty list as a prisoner of war in Germany.

Lieut. C. P. Inches Wounded

Lieut. Charles P. Inches son of Dr. P. R. Inches, Germain street, St. John a member of a heavy battery in France, has been slightly wounded in the left leg. This information was received in a letter from him to his parents. Lieutenant Inches went overseas with a draft from the 9th Siege Battery. Only about one month ago he crossed to France. He was a student at U. N. B. at the time of enlisting.

Private G. Parke Missing

Mr. Erastus Parke of Burt's Corner received official notice this morning that his son Private Goole Parke has been missing since September 26th. Private Parke enlisted here in the 104th Battalion but was transferred to the 26th Battalion. Much anxiety is felt by the relatives and friends of Private Parke as to his fate.

Late Alexander Greenlaw

The body of the late Alexander Greenlaw was taken to Bayside, Charlotte County, last night, where interment was made today. The deceased was aged fifty-eight years and is survived by a widow and one child. The deceased had been working at the Douglas Boom and on Tuesday was stricken suddenly with paralysis while working. He was taken to the Victoria Hospital where death ensued the next day. At the Douglas Boom his relatives were not known but William J. Greenlaw of Bayside learning of his brother's illness came to Fredericton and made arrangements for the funeral.

Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works is in the city today.
