

NASHWAAK FRESHET SWEEPS LUMBER AWAY

**BOOM AT STANLEY BROKE
TODAY UNDER STRAIN**

**One Million Feet of Logs Went
Down Stream—Miramichi
Rising—Fraser's Drive
Expected Out.**

As the result of the heavy rains of the past week the Nashwaak and other rivers in this section of the province have risen to freshet height and much damage is anticipated. At Stanley this morning the boom holding logs for the sawmill operated by Mr. Stanley Douglass was broken by the freshet and about one million feet of logs was swept down the river. These logs will be stranded all along the Nashwaak and it will be impossible for the owner to gather them. It is likely that the mill at Stanley will have to close and the lumber be sold.

Miramichi is Rising

Reports from Boiestown are that the Miramichi river is rising rapidly and that this morning a large number of logs belonging to Fraser Companies Limited were running. It is expected that a drive of some five million feet on the Clearwater belonging to that company will come out safely on the freshet.

St. John Companies

The St. John River is also showing the effects of the rains and is rising but not to the degree that its tributaries are as the rain was not heavy on the Upper St. John.

MARTIN STEWART, A C. G. R. SECTION FOREMAN, KILLED

**THROWN FROM TROLLEY
AT MCGIVNEY JCT TODAY**

**Fore Wheel Broke, Causing
His Death—Two Sons at
Work in Same Crew—
Inquest Tonight.**

Martin Stewart, section foreman on the Canadian Government Railways, a resident of Taymouth, was killed at McGivney Junction at about 8:30 this morning in an accident which occurred to a trolley loaded with lumber which his section crew was handling. Dr. W. T. Ryan of Boiestown was summoned but death had taken place before his arrival the injured man never regaining consciousness.

Trolley Overturned

A crew of five section hands under Foreman Stewart was at work at McGivney. Two of the hands were his sons Ray and Ralph Stewart, the foreman was standing upon a trolley loaded with lumber which was being pushed along by a handcar operated by the crew. A fore wheel of the trolley broke and the foreman was thrown off striking on the back of his head and the load upset. It was seen at once that Mr. Stewart was seriously hurt. Medical assistance was summoned but death ensued about half an hour after the accident. The body was placed on the Fredericton Express and was taken to Taymouth. Dr. B. M. Mullin coroner was notified and will hold an inquest tonight.

Was in City Yesterday

The victim of the accident was in the city yesterday and went out this morning on the "Whooper". He had been at work but a few minutes when the accident occurred. He was a man of middle age and leaves a wife and family.

Death at Marysville

Clifford Gorman son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Gorman of Marysville died this morning at his home after a lingering illness at the age of nineteen years. The deceased is survived by his parents and by one brother Richie E. Gorman now serving in France and two sisters Mrs. McKeil of South Devon and Miss Edith at home. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. Dr. Harrison will conduct the service and interment will be made at the Methodist Cemetery.

DIVORCE COURT HAS RESUMED ITS SESSIONS

**APPLICATION TO HEAR
LOGAN CASE AT ST. JOHN**

**Evidence Begun in Cuning-
ham Case—Record Docket
—Expected All Cases
will be Tried.**

The New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes opened its adjourned sitting this morning with a large attendance of barristers and witnesses as the docket is the largest in the history of the court. Four cases from preceding sittings are on the docket together with eight new cases six of which are undefended and two defended. As far as is known now all cases will be tried at this sitting.

Wants Case Transferred

In the case of Louise Logan vs. Robert Logan, Mr. Francis Kerr, for the plaintiff made application to have the cases tried at St. John on the ground that the plaintiff cannot bear the expense of a trial at Fredericton. The case stands and court considers. His Honor Judge Crocket did not appear very desirous of permitting a transfer of the case.

Evidence Taken

The case of Eleanor Elizabeth Cunningham vs. William Henry Cunningham was begun, Mr. Daniel Mullin, K. C., appearing for the plaintiff. The latter resides in Lorneville. Mr. Mullin read the affidavit of Sheriff Willson to the effect that the order for suit money could not be served on account of inability to find the defendant. Mr. Mullin asked to have the order extended and made permanent. The application stands for the present.

The plaintiff then went on the stand and had not completed evidence when the court took recess.

Ground for divorce in this case is alleged illtreatment, desertion and non-support of the plaintiff and her two children. The plaintiff in her evidence gave instances of assault by her husband and abusive language on his part. The younger child was born after husband and wife had separated. The evidence of the plaintiff was to the effect that trouble between herself and her husband had resulted from statements made by the husband's mother and other relatives.
