

RE-ALLOTMENT TIMBER LIMITS IS REQUESTED

A DELEGATION FROM THE NORTH SHORE

Some Mills in Danger of Being Without Logs—Result of Flemming Crown Land Manipulation.

A large delegation of lumbermen representing operators on the North Shore appeared before the Provincial Government this morning and presented the case of those operators who are desirous of having a re-allotment of the Crown Lands for lumbering purposes. About thirty were in the delegation which was given a hearing until early this afternoon when a recess was taken to resume at 2:30.

The delegation was introduced by Hon. Mr. Murray and Mr. McGrath of Northumberland. Mr. G. M. McDade outlined the case of the operators. Other speakers were Messrs. F. D. Swim, ex-M.P.P., Robert Loggie, J. D. Volkman, D. J. Buckley, J. W. Vanderbeck and W. G. Thurber. This afternoon Mr. D. Mullin, K.C., of St. John will close the presentation for the lumbermen.

The delegation is pointing out that unless a re-allotment of the Crown Lands is made some of the mills on the North Shore will not be able to operate on account of the lack of lumber lands. The difficulty has arisen from the extension made in 1913 of the leases which expire in the present year. The lumbermen who did not get a renewal at that time are now complaining. Interests representing an investment of two million dollars and employing more than a thousand men are concerned.

The situation is the direct result of the Crown Land scandal of the Flemming regime.

PREMIER FOSTER HONORED BY HIS FOLLOWERS

THE ANNIVERSARY OF HIS TAKING OFFICE

Address Presented to Him Last Evening—Premier Thanked Followers for Their Confidence.

One year ago, yesterday Premier Foster and his colleagues were sworn into office and took over the reins of government. The province had been cursed for years previous by bad government and the change of rulers was warmly welcomed by the people. Premier Foster's supporters in the Legislature felt that the first anniversary of the new administration should not be allowed to pass without some recognition so last evening waited upon their popular young leader and presented him with the following congratulatory address:

"Hon. Walter E. Foster, Premier of New Brunswick:

"On this, the first anniversary of your formal acceptance of office as premier of New Brunswick, we, your friends and supporters in the legislature desire to avail ourselves of the opportunity to congratulate you on your elevation to the high and honorable position which you so worthily fill. It gives us the greatest pleasure to congratulate you because of your successful leadership of the past year and because of our knowledge that when you consented to accept the leadership of the party you were inexperienced in the direction of political affairs, which made your task more difficult, and the success of your efforts, due to the great tact, ability and forbearance you have shown at all times, has convinced all of us who have the interest of our province and party at heart that the man we chose for premier was the right man in the right place.

"The first year of your administration was in the most critical period in the history of the Dominion of Canada and the Empire. The affairs of all governments have been sadly disorganized by the demands created by the world war, in which Canada and the Empire are engaged. The financial needs of this province in the past for the construction of large public works have been supplied from foreign sources which under the present great emergency have been closed to us. The fact, therefore, that large public works have been carried on either to completion or to a stage when completion is assured, reflects all the more credit upon the government of which you are the leader.

"It is not our intention to enlarge upon the benefits to this province of your first year of public service, but

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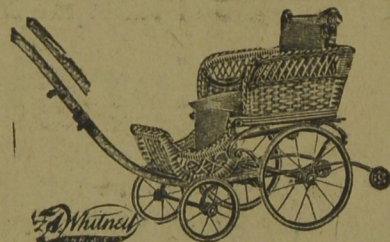
