CHICKEN FAT VALUABLE.

Considered by French Housewives to
be One of the Finest Fats for Mak-
ing Cakes and Pastry.

Do you throw away the body fat of
poultry—big layers of clean, sweet,
yellow fat around the gizzard or from
elsewhere around the intestines of the
chicken?

If you do, say government special-
ists, you are throwing away fat which
French housewives consider the finest
of fats for making cakes and especial-
ly puff paste, and which many Ameri-
can housewives have learned to prize
for its many good uses in cookery.

In certain seasons in New York
and other big cities this fat is so high-
ly esteemed that it brings as much as
\$1.10 per pound. So great is the de-
mand for this fat that many people
make a business of collecting it from
butchers and others who dress poultry
before delivering it to customers.

By using chicken fat in cooking one
can cut down the amount of other fat
they must buy for that purpose.

To prepare it, try it out in a double
boiler or other vessel set in hot water
until the fat just melts away from the
tissues and can be poured off. This
fat becomes rancid easily and should
be kept cool and covered like butter,
and used in a very few days.

HOUSEHOLD THRIFT.

Never sweeten a war.

Try hard to like the new war food.

Custard can be sweetened with
honey.

Never allow soiled clothing in a
bedroom.

Use raisins for sweetening in rice
pudding.

When a hem on any article is fray-
ed, cut off the whole hem and rehem
it; this pays in looks.

Soap rubbed on the heels of stock-
ings will prevent blistering during
long walks and will prolong the wear
of the stockings.

When the linings of boots or shoes
are worn through use surgeons' ad-
hesive plaster. Cut one piece large
enough to cover both sides of the heel
or ankle, warm slightly and press in
place firmly. This also prevents slip-
ping at the heel.

THE WAR GARDEN

Creeping Vegetables.

The creeping vegetables, such as
squash, egg-plant, cucumbers, peppers
and pumpkins, are all tender and
should not be planted until all danger
of frost is over. They require warmth
and sunshine and are useful to fill up
blanks in the garden, although they
take up a lot of space. They should
be protected at night for two or three
weeks after being set out.

A forkful of well rotted manure
worked into the soil under each hill
help greatly where cucumbers are con-
cerned. Place hills three feet apart
with rows 3 or 4 feet apart. Plant
ten or twelve seeds in each place and
thin when the plants are well started.
If beetles appear, dust with fine street
dust to which a very little kerosene
has been added.

Eighteen inches should be allowed
between each pepper plant. Egg plants
are set out with two feet between
each. Three or four egg plants will
supply a family of six.
