Germans Tactfully Cover the Statues of ex-Kaiser Wilhelm they Crowd the Churches.

Treves, Germany, Dec. 12—Little wooden shoes rattled over the rough cobblestones of Traves like stage caviary in the best melodrama when our automobile entered this ancient Prussian city. "Amerikaner!" screamed hundreds of children, scurrying into the streets at the first chance to see these strange soldiers, of whom they had heard their parents talk. The clatter of their wooden soled shoes drowned out even the noise of the entering bands, for each regiment marched in gaily with colors flying and bands playing.

The people of Treves were going to church when the stars and stripes reached the centre of this ancient city. The famous cathedral, the oldest in Germany and a former palace of Empress Helene, never had better attended service than today, for a day had arrived which no Prussian had ever expected and the American flag was flying over Prussian soil. When this unbelievable thing became a fact the citizens sought solace in religion.

Treves on whose city hall is a Latin inscription indicating its ancient ori-

gin and which at different times has been occupied by Franks Huns, Vandals and English, is the largest city thus far reached by the American troops and the scenes as they marched through the streets were dramatic.

The sidewalks were jammed with men, women and children, mostly dressed in simple fashion in black and white and with occasionally a bow of red, white and black ribbon the colors of Germany. Some defiant young girls wore white gowns and these gave about the only dash of brightness there was. Some smiled, a few waved their hands in greeting, others averted their faces and a few stuck out their tongues and grimaced. The majority gazed open eyed and even open mouthed at the boyish looking soldiers who had leveled Prussia's pride, the regiments they had seen march a-

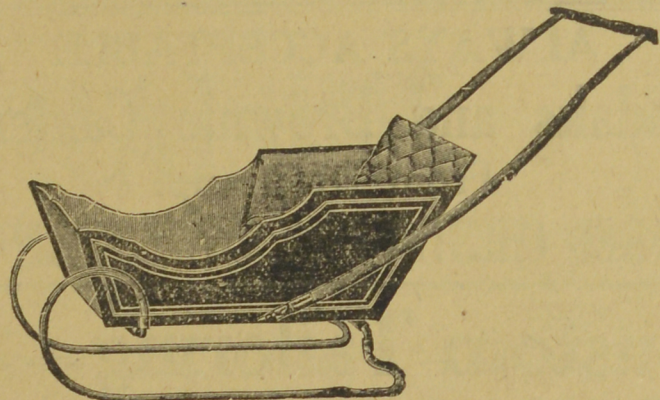

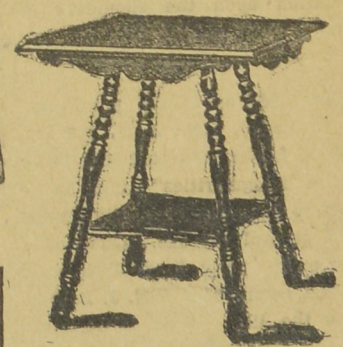
