

C. A. HARRISON OF MAUGERVILLE DIED TODAY

PROMINENT FARMER OF
SUNBURY COUNTY

Son of Hon. Arch. Harrison—
A Successful Market Gar-
dener—Surviving Re-
latives.

Mr. C. Ashley Harrison one of the best known market gardeners in New Brunswick died at his home at Upper Maugerville this morning after a brief illness from typhoid fever and complications. Mr. Harrison was well and favorably known in this city and the news of his death came as a painful shock to his many friends here.

The deceased was the only son of the Hon. Archibald Harrison, who for some years represented Sunbury in the Legislature and afterwards in the Legislative Council. He was associated with his father in business under the name of A. & C. A. Harrison. Their farm at Maugerville is one of the finest in the province, and produces each season many tons of garden produce, which is disposed of in the Fredericton and St. John markets. Mr. Harrison was looked upon as the most successful market gardener in New Brunswick. He was a man of fine character and was absolutely honorable and trustworthy in all his business dealings. The agricultural industry in the province has suffered a distinct loss by his death.

The deceased was about fifty years of age and is survived by an aged father, a widow, formerly Miss Roach of Annapolis, N. S., four sons and one daughter. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Wm. Thurrott of this city and Miss Lizzie Harrison at home.

F. H. HATHEWAY RETURNS; FOUR YEARS IN C. E. F.

ENLISTED IN RANKS;
NOW IS CAPTAIN

Son of F. W. Hatheway of this
City—Brother was Lost
with Good Hope at
Colonel.

Captain F. Harold Hatheway with wife and child arrived in Fredericton last night on his return from England where he has been stationed with the Pay Office of the Canadian Army Pay Corps at London. Capt. Hatheway was formerly employed in the Bank of British North America in this city. He enlisted at Valcartier with the Royal Canadian Dragoons and went overseas with the first contingent. He went to France where he was promoted to the rank of sergeant. On being wounded he was sent to London, where he received a commission and was married. Later he gained his captaincy.

Brother Lost at Colonel

He is a brother to Midshipman Victor Hatheway who was drowned when his ship the Good Hope was sunk with all on board in a naval battle at Coronel. He is also a brother of Mrs. George E. Howie of this city, and S. B. Hatheway of Springhill. He has one other brother Sergeant Leslie Hatheway, who is with the 10th Engineers in France. Capt. Hatheway said he had a pleasant trip across the Atlantic making it in six days.

London is Quiet

Capt. Hatheway on being asked about the condition of affairs in London stated that everything was quiet and peaceable and that there had been no large air raids for some time. He stated that he was home permanently and is pleased to be in Fredericton once more although he says conditions have been very much changed here since he left.

Capt. Hatheway is a son of Mr. Fred W. Hatheway of this city.

for the Fourth Time—One
of Five Brothers on
Service.

Lieut. Ronald Sutherland Machum is included in the casualty list this morning. Lieut. Machum is a son of Mr. E. R. Machum of St. John. He was appointed to the 104th Battalion but was later transferred to a Western Battalion of infantry. He was wounded on August 27th. Lieut. Machum is a son-in-law of Ald. Joseph Walker of this city.

Fred Gorman

Mr. Herbert Gorman of North Devon received news this morning that his brother Fred Gorman has been admitted to No. 74 Hospital Trouville suffering from gun shot wounds in the right leg. Private Gorman enlisted here two years ago in September with the 55th Battalion and has seen much active service.

Corporal John A. Barry

News has been received that Corporal John A. Barry of this city is seriously ill and was admitted to the 10th General Hospital, Rouen, on August 26th. Corporal Barry was wounded on August 15th for the fourth time, and was suffering from the gun-shot wound in the back. He is one of five brothers serving at present. He has four brothers on service, one in the Canadian forces, Capt. Arthur Barry of the 26th; two with the American Expeditionary force, Corp. R. K. Barry and Corp. A. E. Barry, and one in the Royal Navy, Seaman A. F. Barry. These are sons of Mr. and Mrs. James Barry, York Street.

L. Corp. F. H. Kimball

Word has been received that Lance Corporal Frank Herbert Kimball was admitted to the 11th Field Ambulance on August 20th with a gunshot wound in the cheek, but has been returned to duty. Lance Corporal Kimball is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Kimball of Oromocto and is the eldest of four brothers who have been serving in France having enlisted in the West. One brother Corporal Neill Parker Kimball was reported killed on Aug. 8th. He enlisted in a New Brunswick unit and proceeded overseas in 1916 but was drafted to a New Brunswick Battalion at the front where he was killed. Another brother Ernest has been invalided home while still another brother Jack, who enlisted in the province is now serving in France.
