SOLDIERS VOTE INCREASES GOVERNMENT'S MAJORITY

Will Now be at Last Sixty in a Full House
 ---No Changes Made in New Brunswick
 Constituencies---Loggie's Majority in
 Northumberland is Now Over 500---Col.
 McLeod's Majority in York is Also Sub-
 stantially Increased.

Ottawa, Feb. 24. — The Union govern-
 ment has gained both the Cape
 Breton and Richmond seats, Pictou,
 Cumberland and Hants as a result of
 the continental and North American
 military vote. The United Kingdom
 vote is still to be added.

The vote cast in the trenches by
 New Brunswick soldiers was over-
 whelmingly Union. Messrs. Elkin and
 Wigmore polled 1,237 and 1,246 votes
 respectively from soldiers in France
 and Flanders, as compared with 93
 and 89 respectively for Messrs. Bro-
 derick and Emery.

Messrs. Loggie, Hartt, McLean and
 McLeod had their majorities increas-
 ed some hundreds by the continental
 military vote. Majorities of opposi-
 tion candidates in New Brunswick, on
 the other hand, are not materially re-
 duced by the result of voting. Dr. O.
 B. Price of Westmorland, did not have
 official government endorsement and
 thus lost some 400 votes, leaving Mr.
 Copp with a lead of nearly 1,600.

The P. E. Island members remain
 in the Laurier column.

Government Majority Sixty.

The official soldiers and naval vote
 taken in France, in Canada and in the
 United States, as announced today by
 W. F. O'Connor, general returning of-
 ficer, has increased the majority of
 the Union government in parliament
 to sixty. It was forty-five when the
 civilian home vote was counted. The
 soldiers' vote taken in Great Britain
 has all been allocated to the various
 constituencies and a staff of sixty offi-
 cers commenced to count it yester-
 day. Mr. O'Connor expects it will all
 be in by Wednesday when the govern-
 ment's majority may be further in-
 creased.

**PIANO USED BY
 MARY GARDEN IS
 USED FOR FUEL**

The grand piano at the Internation-
 al Hobo college in Chicago which ac-

The last pieces of what was once
 a \$700 instrument went into the stove
 to furnish heat for the lecture of
 Prof. William I. Thomas of the Uni-
 versity of Chicago.

The demise of the piano was due
 entirely to economic necessity, Irwin
 St. John Tucker, president of the col-
 lege, explained.

"It was a case where a piano
 which cost \$700 was cheaper as fuel
 than coal at \$7 a ton—when you
 couldn't get the coal," he said. "We
 were sorry to give it up, but our
 students decided they would rather
 live without music than freeze to the
 strains of Chopin's funeral dirge."
