

DISCHARGED AFTER SIXTY YEARS' SERVICE

**COL. SERGT. W. A. DANIEL
NOW AT NEW MARYLAND**

**First Came to Fredericton with
the 22nd Cheshire Regt. in
1866—Lately at Anna-
polis, N. S.**

After a military career extending over a period of sixty years, Color Sergeant W. A. Daniel, late caretaker of the Old Fort at Annapolis Royal, N. S., has retired on a pension and will spend the evening of his years on his farm in New Maryland. Sergt. Daniel joined His Majesty's 22nd Regiment, now the Cheshire Regiment, in 1858 when a mere boy and saw service with it in various parts of the world. He came to Fredericton with it in 1866 and remained with it for three years. He confederation of the provinces was consummated during his sojourn in Fredericton and the 22nd was the last imperial regiment station at this garrison. It returned to England in 1869 and a few years later Sergt. Daniel obtained his discharge and returned to Fredericton. He was attached to the 71st Regiment and for the next ten years acted as instructor in the old Military School. In December, 1883, when "A" Company of the Royal School of Infantry was organized, he was one of the first to enlist, and was given the rank of color sergeant. He remained in the corps fifteen years, at the end of which time he was granted his discharge. He subsequently operated a farm at New Maryland, and four years ago went to Annapolis to become caretaker at the Old Fort. He was granted a furlough early in the winter and his just obtained his discharge. Sergt. Daniel has many old friends here who will heartily welcome him back to civil life and residence in York county.

Local Man Wounded.

G. Campbell of Fredericton, is reported in today's casualty list as wounded. He was with the infantry. Gordon Kelly of St. Mary's is reported with an injured leg.

Chaplain of the Legislature.

Mr. Walter McGinn, son of Mr. Louis McGinn of this city, fell on Queen street Saturday night and broke one of his thighbones. He was attempting to board a coach at the time and slipped on the ice. He was carried into a store and medical aid summoned. The break is a bad one.

Fifty Dollars' Fine.

A man arrested Saturday night on the charge of being drunk was convicted and fined for that offense in the police court this morning, and also was fined fifty dollars for violating the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 by having liquor in his possession at a place other than his place of residence.

Edward Boyle, a well known resident of Waasis, died at his home Sunday, aged seventy-four years. A widow and several sons and daughters survive. The funeral will take place at eleven o'clock Tuesday morning with service at the Church of St. Vincent de Paul, Oromocto, by Rev. Father Carleton.

Rev. P. R. Hayward, of the Fairville Baptist church, preached his farewell sermon last evening. The church was crowded to the door and the annex had to be used to accommodate the large congregation. Death of Mrs. McCarthy.

Mrs. Bridget E. McCarthy, widow of John E. McCarthy of this city, died Sunday night at her home, 449 King street, after a short illness. The deceased was a native of Fredericton and lived in this city all her life. She is survived by four sons and one daughter. The sons are John E. McCarthy of St. John, Charles McCarthy, station agent of the C.P.R. at Fredericton, George M. McCarthy and Justin McCarthy of Fredericton. The daughter is Miss Mary C. McCarthy also of this city. One sister also survives, Miss Margaret Neville of Fredericton. The funeral will take place Tuesday morning, leaving the house at 8.45. High mass will be celebrated at St. Dunstan's church by Rev. Father Carney at nine o'clock and interment will be made at the Hermitage.

TWO CAUGHT IN POLICE RAID ON SATURDAY

**A DISORDERLY HOUSE
IN CHANCERY LANE**

**Mrs. Devine, the Proprietress,
Pleads Not Guilty—White
Man Inmate was Fined
Heavily.**

A raid on a disorderly house, the first which has been made in Fredericton in some time, took place at midnight Saturday. Chief Finley and Policemen Murray and Jones made the raid on the premises of Mrs. Melinda Devine, colored, Chancery Lane. The proprietress and one inmate, a white man, were arrested. In the police court this morning Mrs. Devine pleaded not guilty to the charge of keeping a disorderly house, stating that she "worked for her living." She was remanded for evidence and the case will be heard Tuesday afternoon.

Given Heavy Penalty.

The man in the case acknowledged the charge of being an inmate of a disorderly house and was given a sentence of twenty-five dollars' fine or thirty days in jail, sentence being suspended. He also was charged with two violations of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 by having liquor in his possession and by giving it to another. He acknowledged both offenses and was given a sentence of fifty dollars' fine or three months in jail on each count.

Two Suit Cases of Liquor.

Two suit cases containing gin and rye whiskey were found in the house and were acknowledged by the man to be his property. The contents were ordered by the magistrate to be destroyed. The police say that liquor of the brands contained in the suit cases has been quite plentiful about Fredericton recently and believe that they have discovered one of the means of distribution.

Complaint Had Been Made.

Complaint had been made to the police concerning the house in Chancery Lane and they were watching it on that account when they learned what was going on Saturday night.

Interscholastic Hockey.

On Saturday at Rothesay Fredericton High School defeated Sussex High School 2 to 1 in the interscholastic series. On Friday Rothesay Collegiate School beat Fredericton 7 to 0. Rothesay C. S. has won the series with three victories and one defeat, that by Fredericton High here. Fredericton High is second.

INTERESTING POINT RAISED IN BEER CASE

**THREE CASES UNDER THE
PROHIBITION ACT TODAY**

**Claimed That Only Chief In-
spector Can Enter Licensed
Beer Shop and Take
Sample.**

Three alleged violations of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 were before the police court today. Two were for the sale of beer said to be over strength and the other for having liquor in possession at a place other than a place of residence. The latter case which resulted from a seizure made at a store in this city some days ago, was acknowledged and a fine of fifty dollars imposed.

Case Postponed.

One case against a Fredericton man who holds a beer license was postponed in order to give the Montreal brewery from which the beer was obtained and which labels all its goods as having an alcoholic percentage lower than that required by prohibitory laws an opportunity of assisting in the defense if it so decides. The case will come up on the 28th.

Interesting Point Raised.

In the case against Mr. Thorpe of Devon, Mr. J. J. F. Winslow for the dense raised a point of great interest by claiming that under the act only Chief Inspector Wilson has the power to enter a licensed beer shop and take samples of beer. Mr. P. J. Hughes who appeared for the prosecution took the ground that the chief inspector could deputize any person he desired to perform that duty and that Chief Finley had acted properly in taking the beer. He also claimed that Mr. Winslow had not placed the proper construction upon the section of the act to which he referred.

Evidence Taken.

Evidence was taken, Chief Finley going on the stand. The analysis presented in evidence showed an alcoholic percentage of 4.06 by weight. In the course of his evidence Chief Finley denied that he was actuated by any personal feeling against the Enterprise Bottling Company.
