BOYS WILL BE **ENLISTED FOR**

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The organization of the "Soldiers of the Soil" movement inaugurated by the Canada Food Board is now practically complete, and work will be commenced at an early date to enlist 25,000 boy volunteers to assist in food production on farms this year.

Actual enrollment will begin on the 17th of March and the following week will be "Soldiers of the Soil" enrollment week throughout Canada. Taylor Stratton, a leader in boys' work, has been appointed superintendent of the "Soldiers of the Soil." He explained today that it is proposed to enlist boys between the ages of 15 and 19 years.
