GERMAN SPY MAY HAVE TO FACE A FIRING SQUAD

Hun Posing as an Officer in the American Army was Caught Trying to Blow up a Powder Magazine at Norfolk---Arrested and will be Taken to Washington for Court Martial--Incriminating Documents Found

(Canadian Press direct wire.)
Norfolk, Va., Jan. 14. — Caught red handed in an attempt to blow up an army magazine, posing as an officer of the American army and with having incriminating correspondence in his possession, Walter Sporrman, an officer in the German navy, is tonight en route to Washington for court martial proceedings, and in the opinion of local federal and naval authorities will probably be the first German spy to face a firing squad in this country.

Sporrman's arrest was accomplished Saturday in Newport News by an officer of the naval intelligence bureau after a chase that led to Camp Meade, Washington, Baltimore, and finally to Camp Morrison at Newport News, where the case was completed. It is declared tonight that evidence secured from the prisoner and incriminating documents involve a number of persons including several women.

in Baltimore, Washington and New York. The nature of the evidence the officials decline to state, as one man wanted is missing. Others are said to be closely watched by secret service men and cannot possibly escape.

Documents Found.

Documents found on the prisoner are alleged to show that Sporrman began his work in this country some time before the United States entered the war. In one letter from Captain Boy-ed, the former German military attache, there is said to have been reference to \$90,000 advanced Sporrman by the chief of the German spy system in the United States. There are reports that it has been established that Sporrman came to the United States on the German submarine U-53 which visited Newport, R. I., more than a year ago and later sank a number of merchant ships off the coast. Officials, however, would not confirm this.

An effort is said to have been made to connect him with the New Year's Day fire here which laid waste nearly two city blocks, but apparently without success.
