Awarded Military Cross.

Briden deBlois Millidge, as an appreciation of his services as forward observation officer at Passchendaele. Lieut. Millidge is now in the first brigade of the first division of the Canadian Field Artillery. Many friends will hear with pleasure and satisfaction of this recognition of his military activities. Lieut. Millidge was an undergraduate at the U.N.B. when appointed to the C.E.F.

Concerned — King's Bench
