DEAF MUTES
GOOD AVIATORS

New York, July 10—Tests conducted for several weeks at Mineola aviation field have proved that deaf mutes make excellent material for aviators, according to an announcement tonight by officers of the New York Institute for the Instruction of the Deaf.

Asserting that the deaf mute is apparently superior to the average aviation candidate, the announcement adds that it has long been an admitted scientific fact that the loss of one sense lends added acuteness to the others. The tests, it was said, showed that deaf mutes were less disturbed by the sensation of flying than normal men, and were more ready for emergencies. Undisturbed by the noise of the motor, they were apparently little affected by the vibrations.

CATTLE JUST
LOVE AIRPLANE
DINNERS

"Dope" on Wings of Flying
Machines Makes Tasty Bite
for Bovines—Fliers
Stick to Ship.

Dallas, Tex., July 10—Discovery that Texas cattle will eat wings of an airplane if the machine is left unguarded is one of the reasons why a general order to "stick with the machine, no matter what happens" is impressed upon every cadet aviator training in Texas. The cadets are instructed particularly never to leave "ships" in fields no matter how far from the travelled road.

The fact that cows have an appetite for airplanes was discovered only after one or two machines had suffered real loss from discriminating Texas cattle.

Plane Makes Good Loot

The wide supporting planes are covered with a cellulose preparation that makes them airtight, known in the technique of flying as "dope," and as "dope" makes as tasty a meal for cows as the bovines have discovered for a long time. It softens under their tongues and the cattle in their eagerness to obtain it, will chew the expensive linen planes to pieces to extract the last particle of "dope" flavor.

Another reason for the order is that an airplane is a valuable piece of property with many detachable parts offering an attractive invitation to looters if one were left unprotected in a lonely field or on a road.

Crowd Swarm Near Ships

Souvenir hunters, however, are much more feared than thieves. Aviators who have made forced landings while on cross country flights say it requires their utmost vigilance to keep curious spectators from breaking up their "ships" and carrying them away piecemeal, so eager are the country people for souvenirs.

An aviator landed recently in a wheat field not far from here. The curiosity and interest in him was so great that in less than an hour the field was so crowded that the owner of the ground had to ask the Dallas police to clear the field to prevent his growing crops from being stamped into a total loss.

RAIN FINE FOR
GARDENS, SAYS
MAINE PROF.

Prof. Hitchings of Bangor, Says
That the Results, How-
ever, Depend on the
Care Taken.


(Bangor News.)

"The rain of the past few days has put the war gardens on the map of Bangor," said Prof. E. F. Hitchings of the war garden committee of the Chamber of Commerce. "The extreme dry May and the cold June were both serious setbacks to our local gardens. Where the seeds were put in early, and had time to germinate before the dry weather, good results have been secured; but in gardens planted late, with seeds not properly covered, the results are what would be expected, and some have had to be replanted. No previous rain has been sufficient to wet down more than an inch or two.

"Our markets show a good list of early vegetables grown in Bangor.

"The rain of the past few days will boost the late planted crops and guarantee a fine crop if weather conditions are favorable. Much, however, depends upon the care given to the gardens from now on. Remember, that this rain is just what the weeds wanted and they too will respond as quickly as the vegetables; also Mr. and Mrs. Bug, and family, will appear with the sun, and strict watch will have to be kept.

"Watch out for the beans, for this rain has peppered them with dirt and rust and anthracnose germs which may cause lots of trouble with partial loss of crop. Wait until the plants are thoroughly dry before stirring the soil. Avoid picking the beans when wet."
