sure that that hon. member had been able to convince his critics on the opposite side of the House that he was well able to take care of himself. He also congratulated the previous speakers who had discussed so earnestly matters pertaining to the financial affairs of the province.

He had listened with amazement to the remarks of the ex-Attorney General, when he had undertaken to lecture hon. members to the right of the Speaker for their attitude during the late Dominion election. He held that every man had an inalienable right to his own convictions and, speaking for himself, he had acted upon those convictions and the dictates of his conscience. It was becoming daily more apparent to many people that patriotism was the camouflage behind which politics had got in its doubtful work during that election. That was not his conception of the purpose and intention of true patriotism, nor was it the best manner of giving expression to one's loyalty to the country and Empire. He did not believe the results had justified the means and the time had now arrived when patriotism must displace politics and selfishness.

Manipulation and efforts towards personal advancement must be cast aside if the people are to give substantial assistance towards securing liberty and freedom, for which so much blood had been shed. Speaking from personal observation he could say that he never had anything to do with an election in which such iniquitous methods and such unblushing deception were openly practiced by certain Union supporters and he believed that more than one was able to break into the House of Commons who otherwise would have received little consideration from either of the old parties.

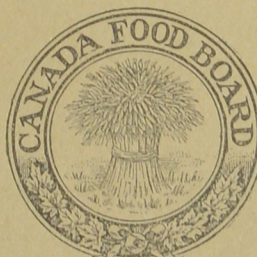
In the War Garden?
