THE ADVANCE WAS RAPID

London, Aug. 12.—The Canadian hospital at Orpington received fifty patients from the big push on Saturday. All were imperials. There also arrived to see his brother, who had been a patient for some time, a young Canadian flying officer, who gave striking testimony of the rapidity of the Canadian advance.

He was flying in the opening stages of Thursday morning's battle.

"There was a ground mist," he said, "and we were given before starting off particulars of where the front line was supposed to be. Our machines went up in the most, but a few hours later, when the mist cleared we found we were over where our front line had been indicated, but were really over our transports, which had come on after the infantry had plunged forward. The infantry was away ahead and the transports had simply followed them up."

THE AMERICAN GIMPERS HAVE THEIR HATS IN RING

Airmen Have to Live Up to the Idea of the Emblem --- Was Evolved From French, National and Rooseveltian Sources --- New Crosses Added to the Ring as Soon as German Machines Are Landed

With the American Airmen in France, July 10—"All gimpers have to live up to the idea of the squadron emblem," explained Lieut. Eddie Rick-enbacker, All-American ace and former auto racing driver.

"Every man has a picture of a hat in the ring on his machine. That means he is ready to fight any time, whether Heinie wants to or not. The squadron is sometimes known as the 'Hat in the ring squadron.' But among ourselves it's Gimpers. We adopted the hat in the ring as our emblem back in our training days. Then it was our hope to be the first fighting squadron to get to the front.

"Our commanding officer who had flown with the French, used to have a hat as the emblem of his machine. Some one suggested that we take the hat, put a ring around it, carrying out the idea of the famous phrase which Col. Roosevelt did much to circulate.

"The hat we had in mind then was a derby, and some one suggested when we were discussing the emblem that it be made an Uncle Sam's hat with stars and stripes on it. The idea was a Gimper itself, and we soon designed an Uncle Sam's hat in a ring of red, white and blue on each machine.

Always Show Fight

"For a long time we could say nothing of the emblem, but finally a couple of the boys were forced down in Germany. I can't say we noticed any difference in the way the German flyers treated us, for they never did have the say as to whether we would fight or not. We always have carried out the hat in the ring idea and gone after

them.

"Doug Campbell added the finishing touch to the hat in the ring emblem when he got his fifth Hun and became the first all American trained ace. Somewhere he scared up a paint brush and painted a little black cross in the ring around the hat for each German he had brought down. They were regular German crosses just like the ones you see on German planes before you let them have it.

You want to look at Doug's collection of crosses. He started them in one end of the ring and made them real small. There are now seven of them in the ring, but they stretch barely a quarter of the way across the ring. That is Doug's quiet way of showing his confidence in getting a lot of Boches before the war is over. Doug wants to have room for all the crosses necessary across the ring, and he's made them small.

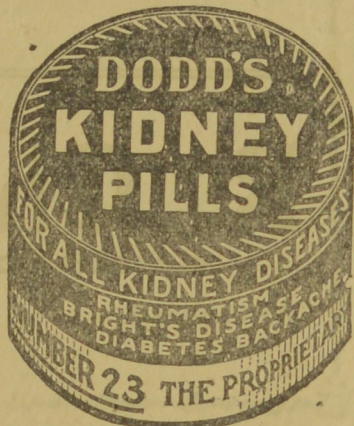
"The rest of the boys are now putting crosses in the rings as soon as they land Germans, and we're getting quite a collection of black iron crosses in the Gimper squadron. For holes made by German shells in our planes we also use crosses, provided the holes are of large enough size. Small ones are too common to count.

"Gimper and Liberty Girl"

"Not a few of the Gimpers put other pictures on the planes by way of an inspiration. I think the best stunt was that of a Gimper who pasted Howard Chandler Christy's war poster of the Liberty girl on the lower wing of the machine where he could always see it. The poster has the words 'Buy Liberty bonds or fight—which will you do?'

"As the Gimper explained to us, it inspired him to fight. 'I see a Boche up there and then always look at the girl on the wing,' he says. 'It says Buy bonds or fight! I haven't any money and couldn't buy a bond up there if I wanted to. So there's nothing to do but fight.'

"We've been out here long enough to know that the Gimpers will live up to the hat in the ring idea, and they never run away from a fight. The idea was a happy one, and it has had a lot to do with the morale of the squadron. The Gimpers started out with the right kind of spirit and enthusiasm, and it worked wonders when we got into battle."

MAGNIFICENT TEAM WORK OF THE CANADIANS

London, Aug. 11.—Sir Edward Kemp overseas minister of militia, said today that official reports covering the Canadian operations until nine o'clock Saturday morning show the achievements of the Canadians in the offensive were the greatest in the corps history. The extent of advance on August 8 and 9 was twelve miles and they went further in these two days than the Germans had progressed in the first two days of their March offensive. The frontage of the Canadian attack on August 8 was 7,500 yards, while the line held on Saturday was upwards of ten thousand yards wide with fighting of an open character.

They captured 7,000 prisoners with over a hundred guns, and machine guns by the hundreds.

On the first day the Canadians were opposed by four German divisions, every battalion of which was identified.

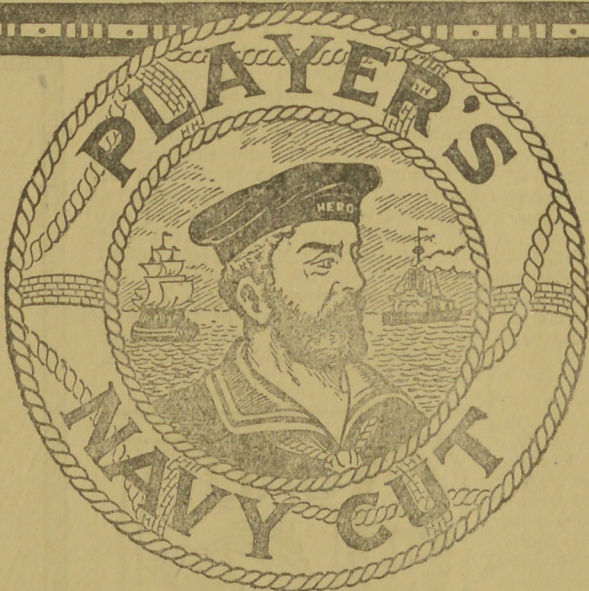
