# ULSTERITES SEND ADDRESS TO PRESIDENT

## Claim Ireland Has No Right to Exemption from Conscription at Such a Critical Period.

London, Aug. 12.—An address to President Wilson, intended as a reply to the message sent him by the Dublin Mansion House's conscription conference early in July, has been presented to the American embassy.

The address is signed by Sir Edward Carson, head of the War Aims Committee and leader of the Irish Unionist party, the Lord Mayor of Belfast, the president of the Belfast Chamber of Commerce and the heads of various Ulster organizations.

"At a time when all the free democracies of the world have accepted the burden of conscription as the only alternative to the destruction of free institutions and international justice," the address says, "it is easily intelligible that those who maintain Ireland's right to solitary and privileged exemption from the same obligation, should betray their consciousness that an apology is required to enable them to escape condemnation at the bar of civilized and especially American opinion. Most of the active opponents of conscription are men who twice were detected during the war in treasonable traffic with the enemy," the message declares.

# SHOULD BE 100 HENS ON EVERY NEW BRUNSWICK FARM

## Should Increase Egg Production Many Fold --- Farmers Are Missing a Golden Opportunity by Not Engaging More Extensively in the Raising of Turkeys and Geese---Some Interesting Statistics on Poultry Raising

Data collected by the Poultry Division of the Department of Agriculture during the spring of 1918 reveals some interesting information in regard to the poultry industry in this Province. This data though not complete for the province is collected from fourteen counties and should therefore express the actual situation very closely. The majority of the reports are from farmer poultry raisers.

Reports have been obtained from 120 raising pure bred poultry and 157 who have cross bred or mongrel birds. The frequency of appearance of the various pure breeds mentioned in as follows. The blood predominating where crosses or mongrels are reported appears in the second column.

The 37 reports showing pure bred Plymouth Rocks did not specify the variety which in practically every case would likely be Barred. This would mean a total of 51 or 42.5 per cent of our farmers have pure bred Barred Plymouth Rocks if they have pure breeds at all. An equally gratifying feature is that the best utility breed Plymouth Rocks, Wyandottes, and Reds are reported in 93 cases

out of 120, a little over 76 per cent.

In the second column, assuming those reporting Plymouth Rock to mean the Barred variety we have these reported in 56 cases out of 157, a little over 35 per cent. The three utility breeds above mentioned occur 105 times in 157, or in over 66 per cent of cases.

Previous to 1918 annual production is as follows:

181 farmers produced 7041 chickens. Average 38.9.  
5 farmers produced 44 ducks, average 8.8.  
15 farmers produced 211 geese, average 14.0.  
12 farmers produced 241 turkeys, average 20.0.

The following table shows what the same farmers offered to produce if possible in 1918.

181 farmers aimed to produce 9630 chickens, average 53.5.  
5 farmers aimed to produce 157 ducks, average 31.4.  
15 farmers aimed to produce 302 geese, average 20.1.  
12 farmers aimed to produce 432 turkeys, average 36.0.

It is unfortunate that the number of birds raised per farm is so low. On the average half of the birds raised will be males which means that each farmer raises about 19.4 new pullets each year. This seems a little high in view of the fact that 347 farmers reporting keeping female fowl have an average of 19.3 each. This figure will be the number reported raised annually. Apparently almost the entire flock is renewed annually which is correct is more commendable than allowing the birds to die of old age, a popular custom in many places.

Other data show an average of 13.2 females per male in the case of chickens, 2.2 for ducks, 3.8 for geese and 1.8 for turkeys. These ratios are quite wide enough for the character of poultry reported and are perfectly safe except in the case of geese in which it is not advisable to allow more than 2 geese per gander.

In the foregoing data two exceedingly unfortunate conditions are revealed viz the low average production of poultry per farm and the low percentage of farms raising ducks, geese, and turkeys. Our farmers would do well to adopt a motto of "100 hens on every farm". This would increase production many fold at no great cost as up to this figure the average cost of production and maintenance per bird is comparatively low. Practically any farm is well adapted to the production of ducks and geese or turkeys and our farmers are missing golden opportunities every year by not raising these classes of poultry.

# TORPEDOED OFF NEW ENGLAND

Boston, Aug. 12.—Fifteen survivors of the steamer Sydlund arrived here today and report that their vessel was sunk by a German submarine Saturday. Fifteen others of the crew were picked up by another ship.

Destruction of the British steamer Penistone and the Swedish steamer Sydlund off the New England coast was reported today by the Navy Department. The Penistone was sent down 100 miles east of Nantucket, and the Sydlund southeast of Nantucket. No news of the crews was given in the department's despatch.

# M. P.'S ARE THE TRAFFIC COPS OF THE ARMY

## Stationed at Crossroads Team- ing with Military Life, They are Important Factors.

With the American Army at the Front, July 12—"They're the traffic cops of the army, and darned good ones too. There'll be no scarcity of traffic cops back in America when the M. P.'s get back."

The officer was alluding to the military police, the organization that keeps order in the army, prevents congestion on the roads and does the work that other departments of the army do not do. The military police have taken an important place behind the lines.

The military police is a distinct organization and is made up of picked men from various military units. As soon as a unit arrives in France the "M. P.'s" are organized from it and for it. They are always known as "M. P.'s" in the army.

Until he gets up to the front and sees things the average man does not realize that there is as much traffic through some battered little town behind the lines as there is on Broadway at least during certain hours.

Not An Easy Task  
So the "M. P." has a big job on his hands as traffic cop. Often there are two streams of traffic and he has a double job to prevent congestion.

Usually there is an "M. P." at every crossroad to examine passes and see that people who do not belong near the front never get there. When you enter a division's area you are always met by an "M. P.", who looks over your credentials gives you information about roads and dangers and sees that you have your gas mask ready before you go in the "gas alert zone."

The "M. P.'s" are made up of the best men in the army and they have a lot of authority.

What is more, they know it—which makes them a little disliked by the thoughtless "doughboys." But every one agrees the army couldn't be run without the "M. P.'s"

# APPLICATION OF B. OF E. REFUSED

Ottawa, Aug. 12.—The railway board in a judgment issued today refuses the application of the Brotherhood of Engineers for an order directing the railways to equip all switch and transfer engines with water tanks low enough for engineers to see over, and with a headlight on the rear. The board finds that at the present time when the resources of railway companies are being taxed to the utmost by war necessities and material and labor are so difficult to obtain, to place, "any such burden upon the railway companies". Apart from the question of expense the board declares that a case for the order asked for has not been made out.
