## THE QUEBEC LEGISLATURE STANDS FOR PROHIBITION

The Entire Province Will go Dry on May 1st, 1919--Bill Passes the House and Only Requires the Lieutenant Governor's Signature--Went Through Without an Amendment--Premier Guion's Views.

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)

Quebec, Feb. 7. — The province of Quebec has fallen in line with the other prohibitionist districts and will go dry on May 1st, 1919.

Hon. Walter G. Mitchell's bill providing for a bone-dry prohibition with the exception of the sale of wine for sacramental purposes and of intoxicating liquors for medical, mechanical, manufacturing or industrial purposes, was put through the second and third reading stages in the legislative assembly tonight and all that it now requires to become law is its passage through the legislative council and its sanction by the lieutenant-governor-in-council.

While a number of Liberal members opposed the bill in second reading none of them cared to propose an amendment so the measure went through without an amendment.

Before the bill was given third reading, Louis Letourneau, member for Quebec East, moved an amendment by which a license fee would be charged each family who kept more than a bottle of intoxicating liquor in their homes. He thought that at least 200,000 families would be prepared to pay a license fee of \$5 which would mean a revenue of a million dollars for the government. The amendment was not taken seriously and caused considerable laughter. It was finally declared out of order.

Sir Lomer Guion, who closed the debate on the second reading of the bill, reviewed what had been done in this province for the cause of temperance and said that when delegates of temperance societies here attended conventions in the other provinces they had been told that Quebec was giving the example.

The government, he said, was ad-

ministering the province of Quebec and its people. The people told them in a way that there was no mistaking that they wanted prohibition and the government had to be guided by the will of the people. If the government had seen that the people wished to continue the temperance followed for the past ten years they would have maintained the license law passed last session, but the conclusion had been reached that Quebec, like the other provinces, wanted prohibition. He felt that the law was the expressing the unanimous wish of the people.

"Everyone has a right to his own opinion," said Sir Lomer Guion in conclusion. "If we have not the confidence of the house we will submit to our fate."

## LUMBERMEN ORGANIZE

## MUST USE WOOD TO SAVE COAL

Montreal, Feb. 7.—The use of wood as a fuel is regarded by the Canadian forestry association, so that next fall and winter there may be more fuel available to provide against any possible shortage of coal. The association which concluded its annual meeting here today, passed a resolution asking the Dominion and Provincial governments to take every possible step to prevent the further spread of the white pine blister.

## MUST AFFIX WAR TAX STAMPS

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 8.—The inland revenue department through Inspector Kelly is making strenuous efforts to enforce the war tax stamps being affixed to patent medicines sold by grocers and others. A certain amount of looseness is prevalent.

In Moncton city recently no less than ten dealers were fined for negligence in this respect.

In Hillsboro five dealers were fined \$50 each for a similar offence.

## PROHIBITION IS APPROVED

Annapolis, Md., Feb. 7.—The Maryland Legislature has practically ratified the federal prohibition constitutional amendment. By a vote of 58 to 4, the house joined the senate this evening in approving the report of the temperance committee for ratification. An amendment providing for a referendum to the people to vote on the question was defeated in both houses.
