

## CHICAGO CLERGY STARTLED AT REVELATIONS OF GERMAN DOCTRINE

**Governor Lowden Informs the Church Federation Council That German Preachers Take a Vow to "Preach the Word as His Gracious Majesty Directs"—Denies the Kaiser's Right to Claim the God We Worship—German God a Monster.**

Chicago, Feb. 6.—Governor Frank Lowden, discussing the spiritual factors in the war, denied to Germany the right to claim the God of Christianity as the German God. The Governor produced data on the German church and clergy and read from the document: "I will preach the word as his gracious majesty directs." The vow the Governor read is the vow taken for the last fifty years by the clergy in Germany.

The five hundred churchmen and ministers who attended the patriotic assembly at Powers' Theatre—the bi-monthly meeting of the Church Federation Council—exclaimed in surprise at the revelations.

The Governor continued:

"The German church has coupled the name of the deity with the name of the Kaiser. I deny to the Kaiser the right to claim the God we worship; I even deny to Germany the pagan gods that a Socrates and Plato worshipped. Their gods knew justice and mercy; the German God is the monster Wotan, who is said to have been in their forests 2,000 years ago, and seen, by the way, by no other peoples."

The Governor declared the war has become a conflict as broad as the planets.

"It is a war between the spiritual and material resources of the world," he exclaimed.

Governor Lowden coupled the professors and the clergy of Germany with the astounding pronouncement of the Kaiser, "Gott mit uns." He piled up a document of German insidiousness.

"We never understood their German ways," he declared. "A mighty nation, we continued to solace ourselves that Germany would not do such things. We thought their professors humble fanatics and believed their doctrine of cruelty their individual aberrations."

"Nietzsche—he was a fanatic. He died insane, but it was the insanity of the German powers as well that he uttered. The university and professors of Germany are part of the state, receiving their appointments from the state."

There was a profound silence as of a disciple proscribing the pharisee when Governor Lowden declared:

"My friends, the German God is not the God of the Old Testament."

The Governor continued to quote from the passage in the document in his hand relating to the German church.

"I will be submissive, loyal and obedient to the Emperor, protect his welfare and particularly endeavor to inculcate fidelity to the King. In particular I vow that I will inform his majesty of any disobedience against his name."

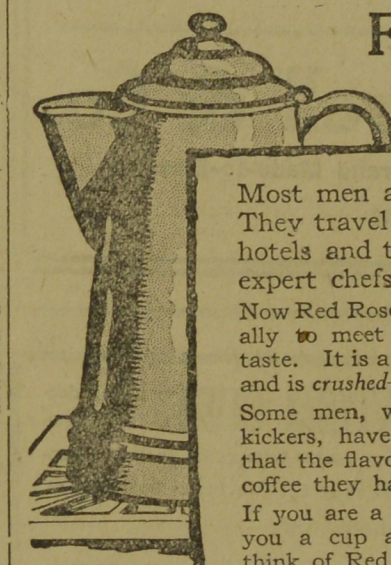
## LOWLY PRUNE CAMOUFLAGING
