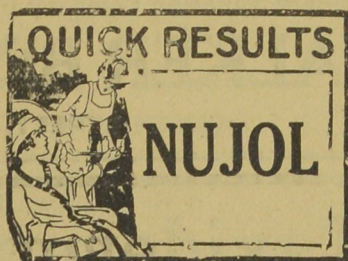
REAL "LUCKY BONE"

THE EFFECTIVE WORK DONE BY TANKS IN THE GREAT CONFLICT

The Idea Originated from the Caterpillar Tractor, an American Invention—Were First Used by the British in the Fighting at Cambrai—Huns were Appalled by the Lumbering Monsters.

An English adaptation to military uses of an unwarlike American invention—the caterpillar tractor—is credited by some of the leading authorities in Europe with having completely changed the tactics of modern warfare. One of the American caterpillar developed the British tank, and the tank has performed wonders never before thought possible on a battle field.

Naturally enough, no one recognizes more clearly than do the Germans who have suffered most from it, the offensive value of the tank. With the introduction of trench warfare "the one and only aim of tactics is to effect the break through," says a writer in the Neue Frei Presse and he maintains that the tank is the most effective weapon for that purpose.

In the days of open warfare the business of breaking through devolved upon the cavalry. In this war cavalry has been useless for that purpose. It has been powerless to operate in the fields of barbed wire that protect the trenches.

After the cavalry was discarded as a factor in effecting the break through the infantry was employed for a time particularly by the Russians, but the accuracy of protective artillery fire and the effectiveness of machine guns made the cost too high, the sacrifice of men too great. Later the artillery de-

veloped drum fire and barrage fire to protect troops on the break through mission, but it was not until the introduction of the tanks that the real weapon for the purpose became known.

The first appearance of tanks in considerable numbers was in the British success at Cambrai last year. The lumbering monsters of that day appalled the Germans by the ease with which they cut through wire defences knocked down walls and trees and straddled over trenches. They went through the enemy lines with little resistance. But those first tanks were clumsy, unwieldy and vulnerable, even to machine gun and infantry fire. After the first surprise, the Germans began to destroy them and for a time the success of tank operation was doubted. They soon reappeared however, in improved and smaller form, less unwieldy, more mobile, better armored and in larger numbers and their success of late has been undeniable.

The effectiveness of these spry moving newer tanks lies, according to writers who have made a study of their operation, in the fact that they can be massed quickly and bring to bear therefore the maximum of surprise. Bad visibility is no obstacle to them; rather an advantage. They attack at one point one day and the next assault a position far distant. They are
