SHIP BUILDING PROBLEMS DURING THE GREAT WAR

Interesting Statistics Submitted to the British House by the Secretary of the Ministry of Shipping—Nearly 400,000 Men Now Engaged in Shipbuilding Work—Big Output is Counted Upon During the Coming Year.

London, Nov. 15—The parliamentary secretary of the ministry of shipping speaking in the house of commons yesterday gave a resume of the shipbuilding problems during the war.

In 1913, he said, the record figures of 1,900,000 tons was reached. In 1914 when the war broke out, the record fell to 1,700,000 tons. In 1915, it decreased to 650,000 tons; in 1916 to about 540,000 tons and in 1917 rose to a little under 1,200,000. During the twelve months ended October 31, 1918 the total output approximated 600,000 tons.

Explanation of these figures, he said rested with the victory over German submarines. Taking the whole period from the invocation of the convoy system in the summer of 1917 to November 2 of this year, the convoys included about 47,000,000 gross tons of merchant shipping and losses were less than 1.1 per cent. This great result had not been achieved without increasing the amount of labor devoted to admiralty construction.

When the war broke out England had about 250,000 men engaged in shipbuilding, engineering and repairs according to the secretary's figures. The number was now 381,000. Of these

however, only 116,000 were engaged on merchant ship work.

U-Boat Campaign

Building now had risen to the mark of nearly 145,000 tons per month, he said and the net loss of shipping had been reduced to a negligible figure, the loss in September being less than 7,000 tons. In short, the submarine campaign had been beaten. The secretary declared that it was only beaten because the government had devoted the labor supply more largely to the admiralty than to the merchant shipping.

The output in the twelve months ending October 31st, 1918, he placed at 1,600,000 tons of merchant shipping in addition to war vessels estimated to be the equivalent of an additional 1,300,000 tons. Thus, he said, the circular output for the twelve months was nearly 3,000,000 tons, as against 2,300,000 tons in 1913 which was a record year.

With the additional shipyard workers who would be released from the front and the transfer of labor from the naval to the merchant yards, he estimated that an additional million tons a year could be produced in the future.

GENERAL SEYN DROWNED OR SHOT

Copenhagen, Nov. 15—Major General Seyn, former governor general of Finland has been taken from a hospital at Kronstadt, was either drowned or shot, according to a Helsingfors despatch to the Berlingske Tidende.

Major General Seyn was arrested in March 1917 by the commander of the Russian Baltic fleet by order of the provisional government. He assumed the governorship of Finland in November 1909 and was noted for the rigorous methods he used to suppress any popular outbreak.

CONFERENCE FAVORS EARLY MARRIAGES

Toronto, Nov. 15—At the concluding session today of the conference of the social workers under the auspices of the advisory committee on venereal diseases for military district No. 2, the findings of the social hygienic held in New York were endorsed, including a single standard of morals for both sexes and these findings added: That early marriage is desirable and that facilities should be provided for the gathering of young women and young men together under proper surroundings.

The conference was strongly in favor of a Canadian national committee to combat disease and agreed that constructive efforts should be directed toward abolishing prostitution.

The suggestion was made that the schools and churches could extensively assist in combating social diseases by throwing their doors open. Moving picture entertainments of an educational character could be held. The resolution of the conference declared in favor of nation-wide prohibition.

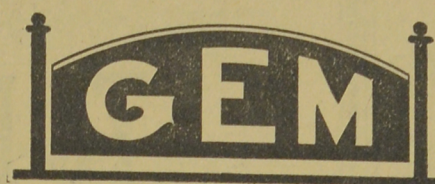
Early Skating
