CANADIAN GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS

Order of Railway Board Not to
be Effective Until Janu-
ary 1st, 1919.

The Canadian Railway War Board
has extended the time for their recent
order regarding the early closing of
railway freight sheds until January 1st,
1919, and the public is therefore ad-
vised that on the Canadian Govern-
ment Railway lines the regulations at
present governing the opening and
closing of freight sheds will continue
in force until that date.

EXTENSION OF TICKETS

Teachers, students teachers and
students at collegiate institutes are
notified that arrangements have been
made by Honorable Premier Foster,
representing the Board of Education,
with the Canadian Pacific and Cana-
dian Government Railways, to grant
extension on return portions of round
trip thirty-day tickets held by bona-
fide teachers and scholars who have
been detained beyond the limit on ac-
count of the prevailing influenza epi-
demic.

It will be necessary for teachers and
students when returning to re-opened
schools to present the return portion
of ticket to the Station Agent with
credentials that they are bona-fide
teachers or students, when a free tick-
et will be issued to each, good only
for prompt passage.

AIRPLANES WILL BE USED IN THE ARCTIC

London, Nov. 14.—The announce-
ment that Capt. Amundsen's Arctic ex-
pedition which has just sailed, included
three airplanes to be used for geo-
graphical and meteorological research
in the Arctic, suggests that, with peace
will come a large extension of the use
of the airplane in exploration.

There is no reason why the remotest
parts of Africa or the upper waters
of the Amazon should be unmapped.
Aerial photography has reached a
stage when all that is necessary for
exact map drawing is a continuous
series of air photographs.

Tracts of Portuguese East Africa
which had never before been charted
were in fact, mapped by means of
the air photography of British avi-
ators.

Th undiscovered natural resources
of a new country can be observed
from airplanes. The eye of the ob-
server reveals much. The air camera
now is an excellent guide in in-
dicating the kind of wood growing in
a forest, and will be of greater utility
still as the development of aerial color
photography progresses.

Railway survey through savage
lands, which both in life and money
has been a tremendously costly pre-
liminary to construction will become
safe, and so cheap as to present no
financial obstacles whatever, to a sur-
vey which uses aerial photography.

Will Follow Rivers
Not only can the course of rivers
be traced but their navigable chan-
nels can be ascertained, and the dis-
covery made of valuable natural
products with the best means of
transporting them by river.

Water, then as now, will probably
be the explorers chief guide and his
machine is more likely to be of the
seaplane type, with wheels. He will
fly high, and should he have to make
a forced landing, will steer for lake
and river rather than for the rare open
spaces of a tropical forest.

For the air explorer the romance of
flying will persist; the value of the
work he will do is obvious and there
are many pilots in the Royal Air
Force today who will find in aerial
exploration play for the typically
British spirit of adventure which they
may feel will be damped down a little
in peace time aviation.

RECIPES FOR MUFFINS

Wheatless Muffins.

Two-thirds c bran 1/2 tsp soda
One-third c ground rice 1 tsp baking powder
1/2 c cornmeal 1 c buttermilk or sour milk
1/2 c rolled oats, 1 tsp salt 2 tbsp molasses
Mix dry ingredients together, add molasses and buttermilk.
Beat well and bake in greased gem pans from 20-25 minutes
in a hot oven.

Buckwheat Gems.

1/2 c sugar 1 egg
One-third c buckwheat flour 3 tbsp fat
1/4 c white flour 2 tsp baking powder
1 c milk 1/2 tsp salt
Beat sugar into the egg, add melted fat; add alternately the
milk and buckwheat flour, then the blended white flour, baking
powder and salt. Bake in greased gem pans.

Buckwheat Muffins.

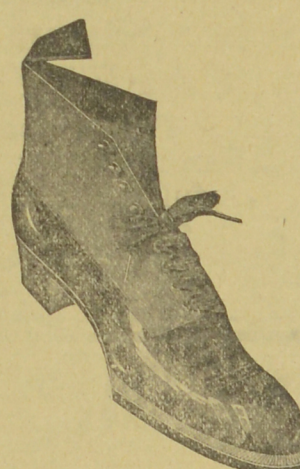
1 c buckwheat flour 1 egg
1 c white flour 1 c milk
1/2 tsp salt 1/4 c molasses
4 tsp baking powder 1 1/2 tsp fat (melted)
Beat molasses into the egg; add melted fat; add alternately
the milk and buckwheat flour, Then add the blended white
flour, baking powder and salt. Bake in gem pans.

Cereal Muffins.

1 1/2 c flour, 1 c cooked cereal
4 tsp baking powder 1/2 c milk
2 tbsp sugar 1 egg
1/2 tsp salt 2 tbsp fat (melted)
Sift together the dry ingredients; add the cereal and milk
mixed to a smooth consistency; add beaten egg, dry ingredients
and melted fat. Bake in greased muffin pans in a moderate
oven.

Three Grain Gems.

1/2 c cornmeal 1 tbsp fat
1/2 c barley flour 1/2 tsp soda
1/2 c ground rice 1 tsp baking powder
1 tsp salt 1 c sour milk
Sift dry ingredients together; add melted fat; beat egg
lightly and add to the milk and combine with the dry ingredi-
ents. Beat well and pour into hot greased gem pans. Bake in
a hot oven 25 minutes.

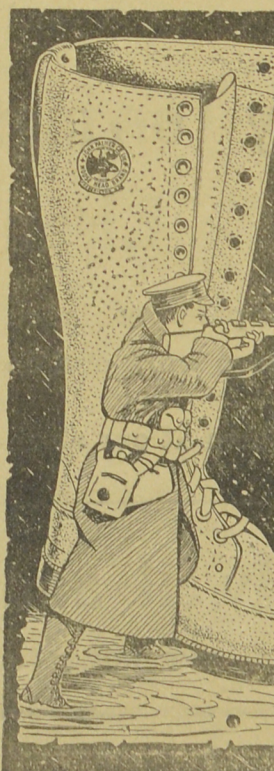
