Resolved that the Society place upon record an expression of its unbounded joy and gratitude at the glorious triumph of the arms of the British Empire and her Allies which on Monday last brought to an end the great and terrible war into which Germany had plunged the world more than four years ago; a triumph which signalizes the final overthrow of despotism and the universal enthronement of freedom, justice and truth as the ruling forces among the nations of the earth. And further resolved that the Society at the same time expresses its deep reverence for the memories of the heroic men of this and other lands, who devotedly laid down their lives on behalf of the cause which has so gloriously triumphed.

CITY AND DISTRICT BOTH HAVE GONE OVER THE TOP IN DRIVE FOR THE FOURTH VICTORY LOAN

Eleventh Hour Effort Being Made to Swell the Total So as to Surpass the Allotment—City of Fredericton, with its Surplus, Made Up Deficiency of Certain Sections of the County Honor Flag Won by City—Some Sub-districts Also Have Won Flags—\$1,600,000 Aimed At in This District.

This district went over the top in the great Victory Loan Campaign early yesterday gaining its honor flag. The stride set up was fast and the sum of \$1,425,000 has been reached for the district. In the early part of next week when all results are tabulated it will be no surprise if the total for the district reaches \$1,600,000. The Victory Loan office here is being swamped with business and can hardly cope with it. When the full results are seen it will be considered a wonderful achievement when one has considered all which the salesmen and canvassers have had to combat with in their work. The Spanish Influenza epidemic has been as bad in York County as anywhere else in the province and several of the local salesmen had just recovered from attacks of the epidemic when the work was started. The salesmen did not shirk their work but proceeded to their work with unflinching courage and results show that their work was well conducted. Can it be wondered at this when the type of salesman is considered. They are men of high type and it is impossible to get the same combination to work together on an ordinary business transaction of any kind. The spirit displayed by these men throughout the campaign has been of the very best. They kept in mind not only their own personal objectives in the campaign but also the objective of the whole district.

County Thought Below

As far as the county is concerned in the campaign some districts have exceeded their objectives while quite a number of others have not yet come up to them. The net results from the county are anticipated to be under the total allotment, which was made.

Honor Flag for Fredericton

On the other hand the city of Fredericton has exceeded its allotment and gained its honor flag. It has taken up the deficiency in the county total and in addition it has given the district a good surplus. It looks now as if the results from the city would be well over \$900,000 and possibly it will reach and pass the million dollar mark. A determined effort is yet being made this afternoon by the salesmen to put more results into the total of the city and districts. Several large contributions are yet to be raked in before the work is finished. The salesmen were busily engaged rounding up the farmers in the market this morning and expect results from them. As is

usual with every work that is carried on with effort and determination results are rolling in at the last minute and the Victory Loan office is being besieged with callers.

Full Returns Next Week

The full returns of the campaign will be published early in the coming week but it looks now, on account of the untiring efforts of the salesmen as if York County would take the second place in the province. A determined effort is being made this afternoon to place it above Westmorland County and bring it into line with St. John County.

Efficient Chairman

Mr. J. D. Palmer Chairman of the Victory Loan committee is the cause of the remarkable results obtained by the salesmen. He has spent five weeks at the Victory Loan office with no remuneration and has enthused the salesmen with the spirit that has made the work a success. Last year Mr. Palmer brought out successful results in the Victory Loan campaign and this year even better results already have been gained. The combined counties of York and Sunbury last year produced \$1,185,000 but this year the county of York with only three parishes of Sunbury will produce \$1,600,000.

A Long Voyage

Capt. J. A. Read of this city is now en route to Capetown, South Africa, in command of the tern schooner Silver Leaf, having sailed from St. John early in September. The Silver Leaf is owned by New York parties and is carrying a cargo of lumber at \$75 per thousand which is looked upon as a pretty stiff freight rate. He will discharge at Capetown and then proceed to Durban and load for a port on the west coast of Africa. She will then take on a cargo of hides for New York. The entire voyage is expected to occupy about ten months. Capt. Read is one of the oldest active ship masters in the world, being within a few months of 77 years of age.

Indian School Opening Postponed

On account of the Spanish influenza epidemic the Indian schools at Devon and Oromocto will not open on Monday. The opening day has been fixed for a week from Monday as the buildings are in need of a thorough fumigation. The school at Kingsclear will open on Monday.

In Winter Quarters

The silent policemen who have been on duty at several street corners since early summer have been taken up and laid away in winter quarters. They will no doubt be back on the job next spring.
