### HUNS ANXIOUS FOR PEACE

Amsterdam, Oct. 5.—Admiral von Hintze who has repeatedly tendered his resignation, has now joined the majority parties and will continue in office. It is said by the Vossische Zeitung, of Berlin. This change in von Hintze's attitude has occasioned considerable surprise in Berlin, it is said. During his visit to main headquarters, it is reported he resolutely championed parliamentarization.

Declaring that Germany is ready to make sacrifices to obtain the advantages of admittance to a league of free and equal peoples, the Vorwaerts of Berlin, the socialist organ, says:

"If our opponents will name the price which individual nations must pay in order to participate in the advantages of lasting peace, then the nation can decide whether or not to accept. Our peoples desire for speedy peace is stronger than ever."
