

## CO-OPERATIVE FATTENING OF POULTRY

**SUPT. McCULLOCH IN  
CHARGE OF PROJECT**

**Start will be Made This Week  
—Chickens will be Fattened  
at Dominion Experimental  
Station.**

Mr. A. C. McCulloch, Poultry Superintendent of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, this week will make a start on cooperative chicken fattening. Members of the Poultry Clubs established by him during the past year will forward chickens to him here and he will superintend the fattening. The Dominion Experimental Station in this city is cooperating in this, Supt. W. W. Hubbard and Mr. Pearson who is in charge of the poultry at the station being interested. The chickens will be taken to the experimental station and kept there while being fattened. The intention is to keep them two or three weeks before killing.

Mr. McCulloch expects that two hundred chickens will be received each week until six hundred are in hand when killing will begin. It is probable that the dressed chickens will be forwarded to St. John and placed in cold storage.

This fattening is being undertaken to aid the club members to get rid of the cockerels which have been produced by the eggs distributed by the Department last spring.

## FOUR LOCAL MEN REPORTED AS CASUALTIES

**CAPT. G. ALVAH GOOD  
IN AIRPLANE ACCIDENT**

**Sergt. Edouard A. Belliveau  
Wounded in Arm—Gerald  
Keith and Alfred Smith  
Wounded.**

Four Fredericton men are reported wounded or injured today. They include Sergeant Edouard Belliveau, son of Professor A. Belliveau of this city a brother of Lieut. A. H. Belliveau who was reported a prisoner of war some time ago. Capt. G. Alvah Good is reported seriously injured in an airplane accident in England. Private Alfred Smith a son of Mrs. Emma Smith of this city is wounded. Private Gerald Keith also appears in the list of wounded.

### Sergt. E. A. Belliveau

A telegram was received this morning by Professor A. Belliveau stating that his son Sergeant Edouard A. Belliveau was admitted to No. 22 General Hospital at Camiers on September 29th, suffering from gunshot wounds in the right arm. Sergeant Belliveau was commissioned in the 165th Acadian Battalion but resigned going overseas with the Canadian Engineers. He went over to France with reinforcements for the P. P. C. L. I. He has two brothers in khaki Capt. (Rev.) Hector Belliveau Roman Catholic Chaplain of the New Brunswick Depot Battalion at Sussex camp and Lt. A. H. Belliveau who is a prisoner of war in Germany. A telegram was received by Professor Belliveau from his son Lieut. A. H. Belliveau this morning stating that he was a prisoner at Rastatt in Baden, Germany. He stated that he was well and writing at the first opportunity.

### Capt. G. Alvah Good

Word was received by Major Frank A. Good this morning stating that his son Capt. G. Alvah Good was admitted to Fort Pitt Military Hospital at Chatham, England, on September 27th. Captain Good was dangerously injured in an airplane accident on September 27th. He was for some time stationed with the Composite Battalion at Halifax which battalion he was appointed to shortly after the war broke out. In the spring he accompanied a draft from the battalion to England where he was for some time stationed with the 23rd Reserve Battalion. He proceeded to France with the 28th Western Battalion and with that unit he won his Captaincy. He passed through the battle of St. Eloi and was wounded at Courcellette. He then went safely through the battle of Hooge. Later he was transferred to the R. A. F. but was sent to England.

## SPANISH "FLU" AT THE MILITARY HOSPITAL HERE

**FOUR NURSES AND FIVE  
SOLDIERS HAVE DISEASE**

**Cases Isolated and Quarantine  
on Hospital Established—  
No Other Cases in  
the City.**

The first cases of Spanish Influenza to be reported in Fredericton have occurred at the Military Hospital, Woodstock Road. The first case was noticed Saturday afternoon and every precaution was taken at once. The cases as they developed were isolated and a quarantine on the inmates of the hospital was established.

### Nine Cases of Mild Type

Major Luton, officer commanding the hospital, stated today that the disease was Spanish Influenza of a very mild type and that serious consequences were not expected. Four nurses and five soldiers are reported to have the disease. Close watch is being kept for any additional cases. Major Luton stated further that the isolation and quarantine were for precautionary purposes.

### Could Not Attend Concert

The quarantine which was placed on the military hospital prevented the soldiers from attending the sacred concert given last night at the Opera House by Picardy Chapter I. O. D. E.

### Could Not Be Moved

Sergt. Richards who is at 112 Westmorland Street, is one of the military cases. His condition was so bad that he could not be removed to the military hospital today. The house has been quarantined and it is probable that he will be taken to the hospital tomorrow.

### No Other Cases in City

Secretary G. Y. Dibblee of the Fredericton Board of Health states that no cases other than the military cases have been reported in the city. All physicians are instructed to report as soon as cases are discovered. Influenza is classed as extremely contagious.

### Provincial Authorities Acting

Hon. W. F. Roberts who is in charge of the administration of the Public Health Act and Dr. G. G. Melvin chief medical officer for New Brunswick have taken the necessary precautions with regard to the disease. A circular to all health boards has been issued touching on the matter. Dr. Abramson chief of laboratories, is now examining germ cultures taken from Spanish Influenza cases and is preparing a vaccine to be used.
