mands for stockers will be heavy in Eastern Canada and in Alberta, and some importations will likely be made, although it is hard to see just where there will be any big movement of cattle to Canada.

It is just possible that the Alberta grass will need the stockers from Washington, Montana and Idaho, and this move will help matters out. Very few people seem to know much about the situation. Western men say that it will help the small man to get feeders this year, especially in the case of dairy cattle, the old duty being prohibitive. Both moves of free tractors and cattle are likely to be immensely popular with western farmers as well as with many eastern men.

ENEMY AIRCRAFT BROUGHT DOWN

Paris, Feb. 20.—Four German airplanes were brought down by French pilots on Feb. 19, according to an official announcement. Two other German machines fell inside their own lines seriously damaged after engagements.

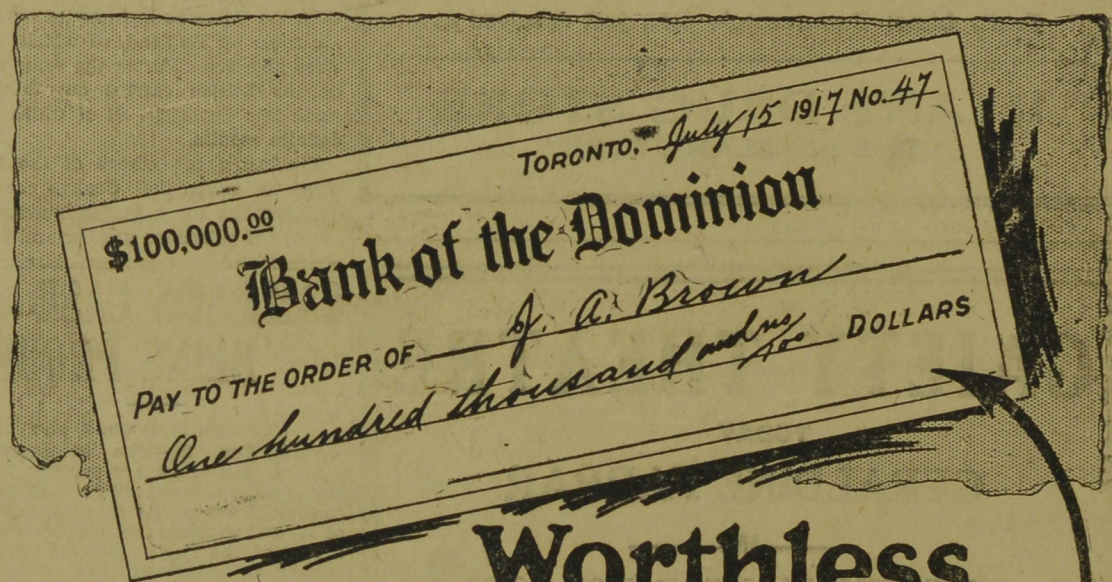

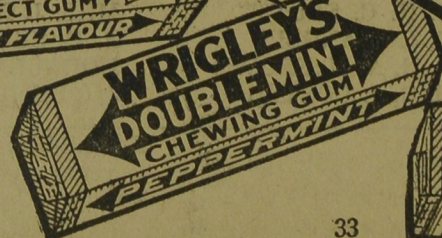
