## BEE KEEPING IN N. B. STILL IN ITS INFANCY

No Doubt That This Important Branch of Farming Will Yield Good Money if Properly Looked After --- The Advantage of Straight Combs is Pointed Out

Beekeeping in New Brunswick is in its infancy—here and there we have a man who has read up on the subject, and putting theory into practice has succeeded, and has been able to gain practical knowledge to convince him that there is money in the business, if properly attended to.

There seems to be one point about which there appears to be many confused ideas and that is, the hive question. Some people buy modern hives and pay big prices for them without considering why these hives were designed. They have their swarms, in some cases without comb foundation, and the bees arrange matters to their own sweet will. Modern hives, without modern methods, are no better than the old box hives—sometimes not as good. Langstroth designed the first good working hive—his idea being to have straight combs, every one of which could be taken from the hive and returned with the least amount of disturbance. This hive has been adopted by all successful beekeepers. There are many modifications of the first type of Langstroth, but practically every frame-hive in use today is patterned after

the Langstroth principle. It is considered a crime to keep bees in box hives in Ontario, and bee inspectors have the authority to warn the beekeepers that unless their bees are placed in a frame hive within a reasonable length of time they will be destroyed. This law is rendered necessary because of the seriousness of the disease situation in that Province.

Modern hives with frame properly wired and filled with foundation are a satisfaction to the beekeeper and a joy to the inspector.

Every large producer of honey has his frames wired and embedded in the foundation, or he could not put them through the extractor without a large amount of breakage. The wires keep the foundation from warping when the bees are placed in the hive, and thus he has straight combs that can be taken from the hives and replaced without mashing bees or leaking honey.

When queens become crowded for laying space, swarming is bound to follow—unless we can remove some of these combs and place empty combs in their place. This is impossible in any hive with crooked or immovable combs.

In the spring beekeepers nearly always have some colonies light in stores while others have more than they require. With straight combs this matter can be regulated by giving a comb of honey from the rich colony to the starving one. In swarming time some beekeepers make a practice of placing a frame of unsealed brood in the centre of the hive before hiving the swarm. This is considered a sure method of holding the swarm and well worthy of a trial by any one. As long as we keep bees in hives the frames of which cannot be handled we are working in the dark and can never expect success by any such haphazard methods.
