MUNICIPALITIES SHOULD ENFORCE THE FOOD LAWS

An Opportunity to Render a Real War Service—Honest Dealers Should be Protected from Unfair Competition—A Campaign of Education Being Carried on by the Food Board—The License System a Strong Lever.

In order to attain a proper observance of its rigid restrictions upon trade the Canada Food Board uses the following methods:

(1) The Board carries on an educational campaign intended to give traders and the public an appreciation of the need for and the purpose of its regulations. It believes in the honesty and patriotism of the ordinary citizen, and assumes that when he knows what the regulation is, and why it is he will obey it.

A card entitled "A Guide to Retail Merchants", which sums up concisely the food laws applicable to the trade is being mailed each retailer in Canada. The New Brunswick Committee has distributed a pamphlet to householders informing them of the regulations that private citizens should observe. As regulations are enacted and published they are mailed direct to the traders regulated thereby, and in different ways an educational campaign is being constantly waged, intended to inform the public and to produce an atmosphere favorable to the reception and observance of the food laws.

(2) The Food Board obtains conformity to its regulations through the cooperation of the industries regulated. As a class food dealers are worthy citizens intelligent enough to recognize the importance of food control, patriotic enough to submit to it, and public spirited enough to demand like submission from selfish competitors. The bakers in Canada have recently appointed in each province from their number a representative of the Food Board to check up their returns and stocks in order to insure from each baker the use of the required substitutes in proper amounts. In some towns local trade committees are formed to instruct the public and to coerce unworthy traders.

(3) The Board has a strong lever of control in its license system. The detailed and comprehensive reports, regularly submitted by several trades, convey to the Board information that would make successful violation difficult.

Each licensee becomes an effective means of law enforcement among other traders, since to sell to a violator is itself a violation. The wholesaler is interested in the obedience of the retailer and the baker, and the latter in the proper conformity to regulation on the part of the eating house proprietor, for such is the interrelation of trade that the violation of one may bring all into trouble.

(4) Dominion Fruit Inspectors are giving part of their time to the enforcement of the food regulations. Mr. W. S. Potts in this Province has accomplished splendid results in collecting license fees, and in securing the enforcement of regulations. In sections outside or organized towns or cities in this Province some private individual, or some special official must initiate action for law enforcement, whereas in other provinces this may
