## GENERAL LUDENDORFF RESIGNS HIS COMMAND

Chief of the Mighty Hun Military Machine Has Quit—Surprise Created in Berlin—The German Government Now Considering the President's Note—The Allies Make Further Progress on Western Front

London, Oct. 27—General surprise was caused in Berlin on Saturday afternoon by the fact that the daily report from German headquarters was not signed as usual, with the name of General Ludendorff.

Later the following official announcement was issued:

"The emperor, accepting the request to be allowed to retire of infantry General Ludendorff, the first quartermaster general and commander in time of peace of the 25th Infantry Brigade, he has been placed on the unattached list. The emperor decided at the same time that the lower Rhenish infantry regiment, No. 39, of which the general has long been chief, shall bear henceforth the name of Ludendorff."

This resignation it is believed in London, will still further shake the faith of the German people in their military machine.

### The Wilson Note

Copenhagen, Oct. 27—Germany's answer to President Wilson's latest communication says: "The German government has taken cognizance of the answer of the president of the United States.

"The president is aware of the far-reaching changes which have been carried out in the German constitutional structure, and that peace negotiations are being conducted by a people's government in whose hands rests, both actually and constitutionally, the power to make the deciding conclusions.

The military powers are subject to it.

"The German government now awaits proposals for an armistice which will be the first step toward a just peace, as the president has described it in his proclamation.

(Signed) "SOLF."

### Reichstag Adopts Bill

London, Oct. 27—The German Reichstag by a great majority, has adopted a bill placing the military command under control of the civil government according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Copenhagen.

### Reply Conciliatory

Basel, Oct. 27—Austria's rejoinder to President Wilson's note is ready, according to Vienna papers. It was submitted to authorized quarters today and will be sent this evening or tomorrow to Washington. It is couched in the most conciliatory terms.

### The War Summary

On the western battlefield the British, French and Americans have continued to make further slight gains against the Germans; in the Italian theatre both the British and Italians have scored successes, while in Asiatic Turkey the British have captured Aleppo in Syria, and are driving ahead on both banks of the Tigris in Mesopotamia, with the Turks unable to check them.

The fall of Aleppo and the continued advance up the Tigris are moves of such strategic value that it is not unlikely Turkish opposition shortly will be entirely overcome both in the Holy land and Mesopotamia.

The French armies, fighting on the forty mile front between the Oise and the Aisne rivers are keeping up their

offensive against the Germans and have made additional gains, taking several villages and compelling the enemy to fall back at various points.

### British Hold Gains

In the region southeast of Valenciennes around Le Quesnoy the Germans have delivered violent counter-attacks against the British. Their efforts to throw back Field Marshal Haig's men from the positions they hold were unsuccessful and heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy by machine gun and rifle fire.

The Americans have begun the second month of their operations in the region of Verdun by keeping up their attacks against the Germans from the Meuse to the wooded country north of Grand Pre. Some further progress has been made notwithstanding continued strong opposition by German machine gunners from behind the natural fortifications which abound throughout this district. American airmen also are continuing their bombing operations behind the German lines, their latest effort in this respect having been made against the territory around Briquenay, north of Grand Pre, in which 140 airplanes took part, sixty of them being bombing machines.

Since the Americans began their operations northwest of Verdun more than forty-five villages have been liberated, an advance to an average depth of ten miles has been made and more than 20,000 Germans have been taken prisoner.

## THE NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 28—Oils, Shipings; Ralls, Motors and Coppers featured the strong opening of today's stock market, further extensive buying being stimulated by the tenor of foreign advice. Mexican Pete, was again the leader jumping 11 points in the first half hour. Advances among shippings. Representative rails, and metals ranged from one to two and a half points. The war group was slightly heavy with the exception of Baldwin Loco. U. S. Steel made a fractional advance but immediately reacted.

## OBJECT TO THE TAX ON FILM EXCHANGES

Canadian Organization May Remove Its Business from St. John to Moncton.

Toronto, Oct. 27—The organization of motion pictures exchanges in Canada, representative of nine of the leading film companies operating in the Dominion have taken exception to the license which the authorities of St. John, N. B., purpose forcing on the exchanges in that city to take out, and purpose moving their business to Moncton. At a meeting of representatives of the Famous players film service, limited, monarch Film Co. Ltd., Regal Films Ltd. Metro Film Service Ltd. Specialty Film Importing Co., Canadian Universal Film Co., Mutual Film Corporation, General Film Co. and Exhibitors Distributing Co. held here on Saturday, a telegram was sent to the city clerk and council of Moncton advising them of a decision to move from St. John, and asking confirmation of action of the Moncton council last spring to induce the exchanges located at St. John, N. B. to move to that place.

The telegram points that the members of the organization object to a city license fee being charged against exchanges operating in the three provinces, which pay a provincial license tax in each of the provinces. It is estimated that the various exchanges operating in the Maritime provinces spend \$100,000 per year in them which they are locate.


