Section 78 of the bill is designed for the protection of highways from heavy traffic in the early spring months. It prohibits vehicles carrying a load weighing more than 2,000 pounds and also portable mills from being hauled over the highways between the 15th of March and the 15th day of May, without the owners having first obtained a written permit from the supervisors. Those violating the section are liable to a penalty not exceeding \$50. Motor vehicles will not be allowed on the highways in the spring when the frost is coming out of the ground, without obtaining permission from the supervisors.
