INFLUENCE OF GREAT WAR ON THE LIVES OF CHILDREN

Noted American Author Tells of His Experience in France --- Boys and Girls of France Have Wonderful Examples of Heroism and Sacrifice to Emulate

(New York Sun)
What effect will the war have upon the lives of the children of today in whose frail little hands the future lies? Will those whose only playgrounds for the last four years have been battlefields be equal to the mighty task of rebuilding a world?

Vance Thompson, the author, who has recently returned from Europe, where he is Director of the Foyer of the French Army, believes that the children of France will be equal to anything just as the French people of this generation have proved themselves insuperable.

"When the woman and children of France find themselves faced with the great task of rebuilding their country they will perform it wonderfully, he said.

"All children are imitators and none has ever had such examples of heroism and sacrifice to emulate as have the little boys and girls of France today. Their fathers and mothers have been lifted to higher ideals by the war. In reality they are giving everything for an ideal and the children are getting the reflex action of their superb spirit.

Splendid Heroism

"The way in which the children have adapted themselves to the war is very extraordinary," he told the newspaper woman. They have assumed the responsibilities of men and women and they bear them with the dignity of grown people.

"Children as you know, he continued, 'have always lived in a world of make believe in which they pretended that they were grown ups. Now this make believe world has become real. For children are doing their part with the women, the aged men and mutilated soldiers in carrying on the work of France. Instead of pretending that she is the manager of her father's store a little girl of 10 years now frequently is, and she plays this game with great importance.

Child as Cashier

As an illustration Mr. Thompson told of a child whom he had seen in a small French town filling the post of cashier and manager in her father's inn.

"An ancient peasant had been broken in by this little girl as a waiter," he said, "and she led him a merry life, ordering him around with awesome dignity and never a smile."

"But later as she stood in the doorway watching her guests depart in an automobile loaded with boxes her grown up airs suddenly slipped from her. She became a child again and danced about joyously, willingly bartering a kiss for a bar of chocolate.

"In towns and villages that are constantly under fire," he related, "the children go marching off to school each day with their books under their arms and their gas masks on. They look like weird little gnomes, but they set forth as calmly as if going to school under such circumstances was the most natural thing in the world.

"You frequently see them playing in houses that have been half destroyed by bombs. And all of their games are about the war. There is not one thing in the war that they have not made a game of," Mr. Thompson declared. "Instead of being frightened or sad these children are living in a fairy tale. And many of the experiences that seem tragedies to us are wonderful adventures to them.

"A child whom I knew," said he, "was separated from its mother and sister during the German drive and a few weeks later found them at a railroad station. To both children it was the most splendid adventure, far more wonderful than Cinderella.

"A short time ago I paused beside a group of children to ask what they were playing. They replied that they were playing 'President Wilson.' I was unable to stay to see what the new game was, but one glimpse showed me that it had plenty of action and was decidedly no game of watchful waiting.

"But there is another type of child upon whom the war has had a very different effect," added Mr. Thompson. "This type is represented by the children one finds among the ruins of

destroyed towns. They are like little wild animals. Many of the women and older children have been driven away in slavery, others have gone into exile but great numbers of the children are left. They hide among the ruins creeping out at night and prowling around for food. They are like furtive animals, and at the sound of footsteps they disappear. Most of them are mere babies from 5 to 8 or 9 years of age. In the strip of country recovered by France there were dozens of such destroyed villages, and 400 of these children were taken to one hospital back of the lines."

"And the children who have been mutilated? questioned the reporter. "Are they able to forget and to learn to play again?"

Mr. Thompson was silent for a moment.
