Restoration of Homes is the First Step—The Last Shell Thrown Into the City Hit the Historic Cathedral-Its Towers Stand After All the Bombardment It has Undergone-Rheims the Largest French City Destroyed by the Enemy.

> PARIS, Nov. 26.—The work of reconstruction has begun Rheims. The city is known around the world as the su-

The moment shells ceased falling the population streamed back and began work under the direction of Dr. Langlet, the done, never another boil comes and health and strength are permanently mayor of Rheims. An eye-witness says the final bombardments were more terrible than any the city had endured before. Only wreckage remains. The famous cathedral is a desolate ruin. The scorched, blackened and shell-pitted towers that still stand -as if by a miracle—are in peril of falling.

The towers were swept by flames as the retreating Hun wielded his final firebrand. Statues surrounding the cathedral are only charred ruins.

A gigantic task lies ahead of Dr. Langlet, but he has formed plans of reconstruction, after reorganizing the municipal government of Rheims. Restoration of homes comes first. I will be years before the great cathedral can be restored—if it ever is. A decision has not yet been reached. Many French papers are urging that it be left—as suggested by Lord Derby, British Ambassador to France—as a temple of ruins, a perpetual memorial to the world-scourge the Huns would have wreaked if the world had not risen to stop them.

The very last shell thrown into Rheims by the retreating Huns hit the cathedral. It tore a few more stones from an old Ottawa, Nov. 26-It is understood breach in one of the arches of the ceiling.
