

# A PYROTECHNICAL DISPLAY PUT ON BY THE OPPOSITION

Gallery Performance was Planned for the Benefit of the Big St. John Delegation, But Slipped a Cog---Consideration of Woman Suffrage Bill Held Over---Mr. Baxter in a Wrathful Mood.

The New Brunswick Power Company's bill, which is being dealt with by the Corporations Committee, occupied the centre of the stage yesterday; consequently little business was transacted in the House proper. It met at three o'clock and adjourned at four to allow the Corporations Committee to meet. The sitting, though brief, was marked by a pyrotechnical display on the part of the opposition, the like of which has not been witnessed in the House for some years. Just about the time that had been restored His Honor the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and gave his assent to a number of bills that had been passed.

The House met at 3 o'clock. MR. MURRAY (Kings) said that when the bill relating to the patriotic fund was before the Committee of the House last evening, he had objected to its passage and had not since changed his mind. He said the amount it was proposed to assess was greater than was needed for the Can-

adian Patriotic Fund and he thought if the government intended to assess for the same amount as last year they should bring in a separate bill. Holding the views that he did, he would move, seconded by Mr. Baxter, that the bill be not read a third time, but that it be referred back to a committee of the whole House with instructions to amend the same by reducing the amount of assessment to \$400,000.

HON. MR. ROBINSON, on the motion being put by the chair, said that while the resolution was in order, there was some doubt in his mind as to whether or not it could embody instructions to the committee. He was not prepared to give an opinion on the question and would like the Speaker to take the point of order into consideration.

MR. BAXTER said that before moving the resolution, they had satisfied themselves that it was according to constitutional practice.

HON. MR. SPEAKER said that he would take the matter under consideration.

MR. BURCHILL presented the report of the Committee on Standing Rules.

MR. TILLEY introduced a bill to enable the city of St. John to appoint a commission on matters relating to the New Brunswick Power Company.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said that on Monday last he had given notice of motion for today, which had not been called by Hon. Mr. Speaker.

HON. MR. SPEAKER said that through an error the matter had not reached the committee on standing rules. It was now before the Committee, however, and would be dealt with forthwith.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said that he had given notice of his intention to introduce important legislation and he held that it was not necessary for it to be sent to the committee on standing rules.

HON. MR. SPEAKER said that he would look into the matter and see whether or not the hon. member was right.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said that he would bow to the ruling of the chair, but he was unable to see why there had been any delay. He had asked for leave to introduce a bill and the matter should not have been held over, as the session was getting well advanced.

HON. MR. FOSTER said that as far as his side of the House was concerned, there need be no delay. They had been prepared to take the matter up, but had been informed that it must be dealt with by the committee on standing rules.

MR. BAXTER wanted to know by what means the hon. premier had been so informed and in whose mind existed the idea that the standing rules committee had anything to do with the matter. When private bills were introduced it was necessary to give ten days' notice, but that rule did not apply to a public bill. A bill of the kind which the hon. leader of the opposition intended introducing did not require any interference from the standing rules committee. It was absurd to say that hon. members to the left of the Speaker had not the right to bring forward such legislation.

HON. MR. ROBINSON said that under Rule 66 it was necessary for a motion, such as had been made by the hon. leader of the opposition to have the bill attached to the same. He could not interpret the rule in any other way.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said that he had given notice of motion and had asked leave to introduce a bill.

HON. MR. ROBINSON said that the rule required the bill to be attached to the motion. He thought he understood the English language as well as the hon. leader of the opposition.

MR. BAXTER claimed that the rule specified the title of the bill but excluded its contents. He wished to say that the House was entitled to an impartial judgment from the chair and not one suggested by a member of the administration.

HON. MR. SPEAKER said he would give his decision tomorrow.

Some hon. members—Oh! Oh!

HON. MR. ROBINSON said that they did not propose to act on the dictation of any hon. member opposite and he felt that those on his side of the House could well take care of themselves. He could understand the position in which the hon. member from St. John County had placed himself.

MR. BAXTER said that he was determined to have it understood that the Hon. Speaker must not act under dictation from a member of the government.

Some hon. members—Order! Order! Order!

HON. MR. SPEAKER said that he resented such an insinuation. He had given his decision and it would stand. MR. BAXTER—"It stands, but not understands."

Some hon. members—Order! Order! Order!

HIS HONOR THE LIEUT. GOVERNOR entered the House at this stage and gave his assent to a number of bills passed during the session.

HON. MR. SPEAKER on resuming the chair, announced that the House would take recess until 8 o'clock p.m. The House resumed at 8 p.m. and immediately adjourned.

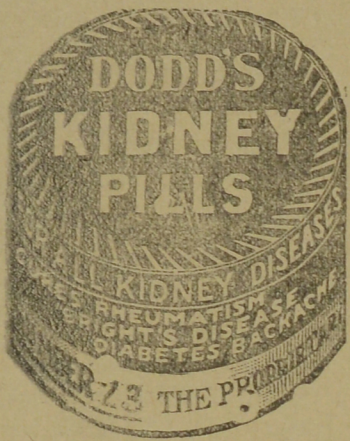

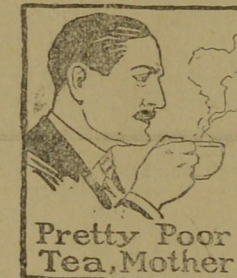

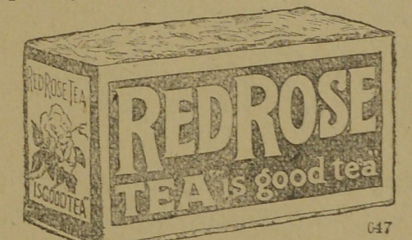
