SOME POLITICAL HISTORY RECALLED BY MR. LEBLANC

Member for Restigouche gets After Some of the Great Reformers of the Opposition ---Dr. Landry's White Sheep Besmirched by Recent Investigations---Praise for the Public Health Bill.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, the clever young member for Restigouche, delivered a fighting speech on the budget in the Legislature on Wednesday evening. The official report of his remarks is as follows:

MR. LEBLANC assured the House that he would not burden with details of bookkeeping; that aspect of the case had been fully dealt with by other hon. members. He would like to analyze the reasoning of the gentlemen opposite and the reasons for the criticism levelled at the government of which he was proud to be a supporter. Hon. gentlemen of the opposition had taken two divergent lines; one was the extravagance of the government and the other was the great things that would have been done if the Murray government had been returned to power.

They allege extravagance, but were afraid to tell that the big expenditures were infants left on the doorstep by the late government for which the present administration must care. Their criticisms showed inconsistency and brazen effrontery. In the county of Restigouche the reports show that \$959 of old bills had been paid for road work. He asked when this work had been done; was it after October 31? If not, why were the bills held back? Was it to show one of those "ancient surpluses"? The speaker who preceded him had raised a cry about colonization roads. The sum of \$7,000 had been voted for this purpose last year, but more than \$3,000 of this amount had been spent by the late administration; he did not know where. In Restigouche, apparently \$1,400 was spent in November and December. The county did not get much benefit from this and their candidates did not get much either. If money for colonization roads was spent in northern counties, it was not the fault of the government because these are the only counties, except Victoria, where colonization was in progress. If the member from St. John would travel along the International railroad, he would see the fine villages which are springing up and he would understand the situation.

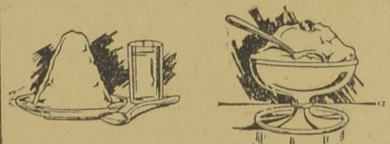

MR. TILLEY—"I have no objection to the expenditure being made in the northern counties. What I said was that other counties did not receive their share."

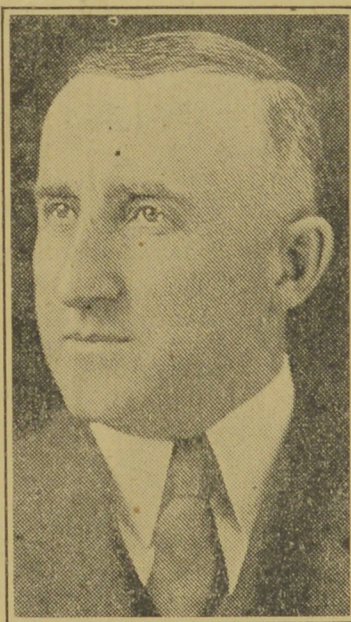
MR. LEBLANC, continuing said that he was glad to see that his hon. friend had been converted. For himself he hoped to live to see the day when the government could devote \$25,000 a year to colonization roads.

He was surprised that the ex-attorney general thought it a duty to wash off aspersions cast on his good name and character as the result of recent investigation. He was surprised that the hon. gentleman had spent three-quarters of his time on a subject which, if he had been wise he would have left alone. When he tried to make little of the proceedings of the counsel for the government and tried to excuse his own evidence given before that commission, he shows that he is the kind of man whose criticisms may be taken with a grain of salt.

Those White Sheep.

In a speech delivered by the ex-provincial secretary in 1910, Dr. Landry had referred to the supporters of the then government as white sheep not soiled with graft and suspense accounts. If that gentleman could return to the House to look for his white lambs who had been playing in the burnt land of Dugai, Chandler and McKeown investigations, he would find it hard to recognize them in the besmirched old rams, who had come wandering back.

When his hon. friends of the opposition were in power, their energies were directed towards other activities than formulating progressive legislation and now they find it necessary to oppose such legislation. When a progressive health act is proposed, they paint it in deplorable colors. When they denounce the expense they avoid mention of the benefits to be derived. The lives which would be saved through proper health control would more than offset the expense entailed, to say nothing of the benefit

to humanity. The province is still paying off the debt of the last smallpox epidemic. If the province had been properly organized, the outbreak of smallpox last fall would not have had an opportunity to spread. The hon. gentlemen seem to have more regard for cattle than for the lives of the people. They criticize, but they have no idea of what alternative to suggest; each has a different theory. The hon. member from St. John had attacked the government because work had been done on a bridge at the Reversible Falls, without tenders being called. He quoted letters from the provincial bridge engineer to the premier and the minister of public works to show that this had been done because the engineer had pronounced the work an urgent necessity; that the season was late and little time was left to accomplish it; and that labor conditions in St. John at that time made it difficult to arrange for contracts. The work was done on Force Account, plus ten per cent, the ten per cent including the expense for scaffolding.

MR. POITS—"How do you figure it?"

MR. LEBLANC said the information was given in the House that afternoon. The hon. gentleman should have been present.

Up to the present the administration had nothing to fear from the criticism of the opposition, especially when the precedent comes from the remnant of a party which had been turned out of office.

MR. SMITH (Carleton):—"We represent a considerable portion of the people."

MR. LEBLANC agreed with this. They represented a fine section of the province; he hoped that these sections would improve their representation at the first opportunity.

So long as the gentlemen opposite continue this line of criticism, with no suggestion for a substitution of able legislation, the people of the province will thank God that they are in opposition.
