A LULL IN THE FIGHTING ON THE WESTERN FRONT

A Pause in the Great Allied Offensive After Eight Weeks of Strenuous Work ---Territory From the Marne to the Aisne Has Been Cleared of Huns --More Town Evacuated

New York Sept. 11—The Associated Press tonight issues the following: Eight weeks to the day, and for the first time since, the great allied offensive of Marshal Foch is at a virtual pause.

True, both the British and French on isolated sectors of the front extending from Flanders to the east of Soissons again have recorded advances, but Wednesday witnessed no such progress by the Allies toward strategic objectives as past days had brought them—before the torrential rains turned the lowlands into impassable marshes and the badly worsted enemy rushed reinforcements forward to stop the gaps through which the British, French and American armies were threatening to filter and wreck his entire military system.

During the eight weeks which had past the allied troops have cleared in almost its entirety the enemy-held territory from the Marne to the Aisne in the apex and Soissons and Rheims respectively its western and eastern anchor points; from Soissons to Arras the old bulge westward to Montdidier and toward the doorstep of Amiens has all but been obliterated and the Allies now are standing across a large portion of the old Hindenburg defence line and virtually are upon the remainder of it, while to the north in Flanders the deep salients threaten the English Channel ports have been bent eastward and the enemy is expelled from the vantage points from which he had expected ultimately to make his drive in an endeavor to gain the seaboard and thus cause a diversion of the transport service from England to southern France.

Douai Evacuated

Washington, Sept. 11—Systematic evacuation of the town of Douai, one of the important forward bases of the present German line in France, is described in official advices reaching Washington today. A vast amount of war material is being taken out of the town, the report says, including the equipment of the arsenal there, which was the largest establishment of the kind maintained by the enemy in the northern region of his advanced lines.

The advices state that the removal of this equipment has been in progress more than ten days and that the equipment at the Brayelle airdrome near Douai, also was being taken further to the rear. The same precautions are being taken with equipment at an enemy aviation field at Lecelles, near St. Amand. That field, the report states, was specially established in connection with the raids by German aircraft along the English Channel coast.

It is between Douai and Cambrai that the British have broken through the first defences of the Hindenburg line and this detailed statement of the German withdrawal of material from Douai appears to bear out previous reports that the enemy was preparing for the abandonment of this section of his great fortified line, which has been imperiled by the British advance.

Local British Gains

London, Sept. 11—The British in local operations have further advanced their line north of Epehy and in the neighborhood of Vermand, west of St. Quentin according to Field Marshal Haig's communication issued to-night.

Worrying the Austrians

Rome, Sept. 11—British troops yesterday raided the Austro-Hungarian positions on the Asiago Plateau on the Mountain front and inflicted considerable losses on the enemy, according to the official statement issued today by the Italian war office.

The British took seventy-seven prisoners and captured abundant war material.

In the Monte Asolone region Italian forces captured enemy positions and held them despite violent counter-attacks.

The Italians took prisoners in the Laon, Valarsa and Ornic valleys and occupied the island south of Ponte De Piave, annihilating the garrison.

ENDORSED BY THE CLERGY

Washington, Sept. 12—Despite the bitter resistance of the Austrian government, which sought to prevent publication of the declaration of the Czech deputies in favor of an independent Czechoslovak state, all of the clergy of the Bohemian dioceses have united in endorsing it. Because of its influence, the sanction of the clergy, as reported today in cable despatches caused a profound impression in Austria-Hungary and led to strong denunciation by the Vienna newspapers.

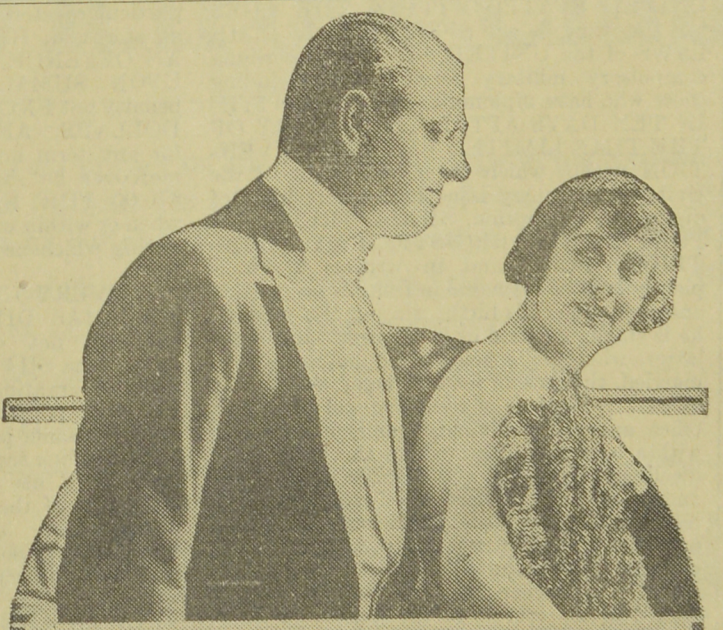
